

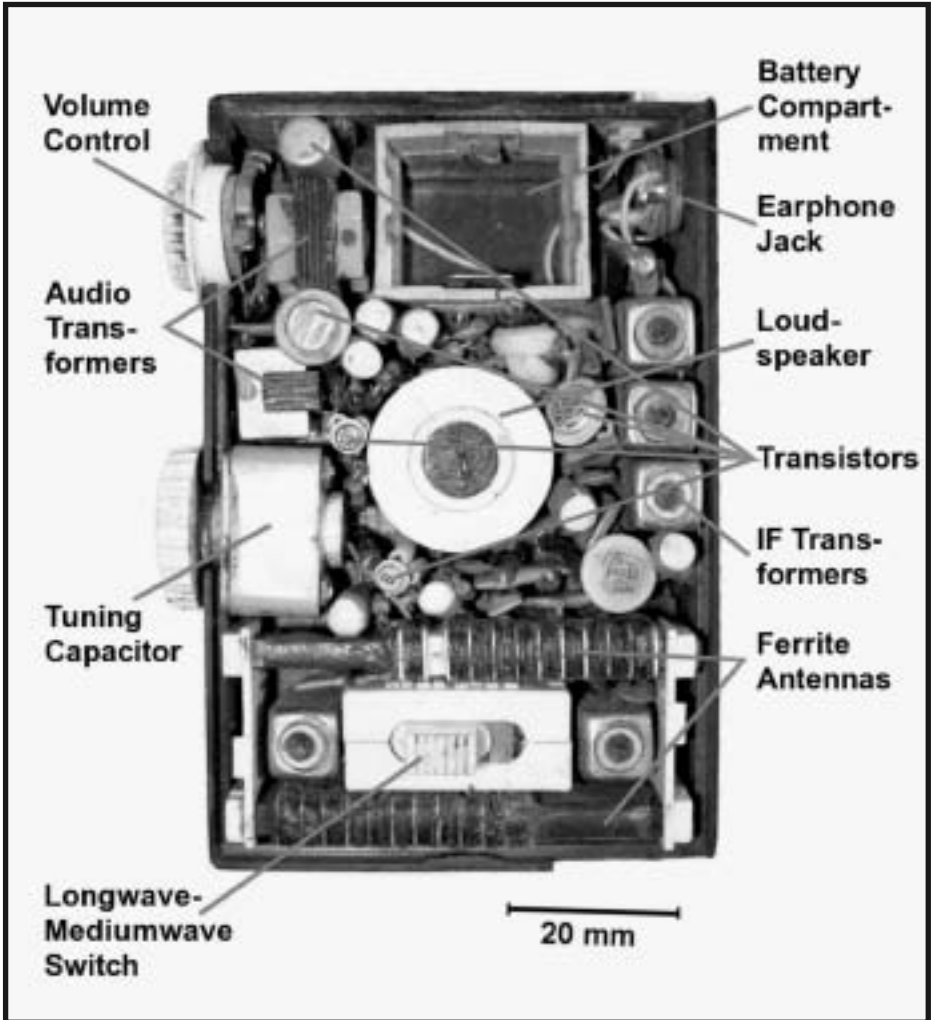

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The weather for our February meet was totally different from that of the December meet. Snow and slippery roads limited attendance in December, but February 12th was cloudy, with temperatures in the mid-30s and just a little light rain. Extra tables had to be scrounged to accommodate the many sellers, and well over 100 people came to look, buy and catch up with friends after surviving two and a half months of another grey Illinois winter.

Both buyers and sellers came out in good force. This meet is traditionally smaller than our December event. Even so, an impressive 21 swap meet tables were sold, two more than last year. Our donation auction also reached an unexpected total. In the end, all the various donations added a highly respectable \$676 to the club's coffers. Thanks again to Tom Kleinschmidt for the great job as auctioneer and Jim Novak as spotter.

While we are still on the topic of the donation auction, I would like to emphasize the important role our donation auctions play in the financial health of our club. Consider that our last auction alone brought in the equivalent, in dollar terms, of 27 one-year club memberships. That is a substantial contribution that not only helps to offset the costs of our regional meets, but also gives us greater financial resources to use in providing an even better experience at our other functions like *Radiofest*. So if there is something in your collection of "radio stuff" that has been sitting there forever, just taking up space, something you have lost interest in, or will never get to, consider donating it to one of our donation auctions. You will be helping out your club, your fellow club members will be grateful, and your spouse just might thank you too.

REGISTER EARLY FOR JUNE HAMFEST COMBINED MEET WITH SIX METER CLUB

The June ARCI swap meet will be a joint event with the Six Meter Club of Chicago on Sunday, June 18, 2017 at the DuPage County Fairgrounds, 2015 Manchester Rd., in Wheaton - just a bit south and west of our ARCI meets at the American Legion in Carol

Stream. Last year more than 1,200 radio enthusiasts and hams from 16 states and with visitors from Canada and Mexico participated in the giant flea market and other events, including many ARCI members who were able to park in a special area designated as ARCI Swap Row.

We will have displays from AMSAT, ARRL, NWS/Skywarn and dealer displays. And, the Midwest Classic Radio Net's *Hamboree* will be back with us again. MCRN is a gathering of hams that operate "boat anchor" equipment on a weekly 3885 kHz AM net.



Everyone **MUST** have a Hamfest ticket to attend. Tickets are still only \$6 in advance, or \$8 at the gate. There is no charge for outdoor flea market space - please see the registration form for information. Jim Novak will have advance tickets at our April 30th ARCI meet. As usual, ARCI will have its donation auction at 10 am along with the 50-50 drawing. In addition, if you deposit your Hamfest ticket stubs in the drum near the stage in Building 2, you have a chance to win many other prizes including \$300, \$200 and \$100 cash.

Indoor flea market sellers and commercial dealers will be in Buildings 2, 3 and 4 with the outdoor flea market to the east of the Exhibition Hall building and extending north along the east side of the fairgrounds. All traffic will enter and exit through gate S-7 located east of the main exhibition hall. For ham operators, station K9ONA will be on the air, serving as a talk-in station on two meter FM, 146.52 simplex and through the 146.37/97 repeater (107.2 Hz tone). Food, coffee and soda will be available from the Romeoville Knights of Columbus.

For anyone wishing to take an FCC Amateur Radio license exam, testing will be held from 9 to 11 am.

The Hamfest opens to the general public at 7 am (buildings at 8 am), but ARCI members who are willing to help direct traffic for parking – we will need help keeping ARCI Swap Row open for members – can enter at 6 a.m. providing you have an advance ticket and can show positive ARCI ID (your current membership card). You can then pick out your favorite flea market parking space and lend a hand for a few minutes when the gates open at 7. We could also use some help Saturday afternoon after 2 pm setting up signs, the PA system, tables, etc.

RADIOFEST 2017 IS COMING!

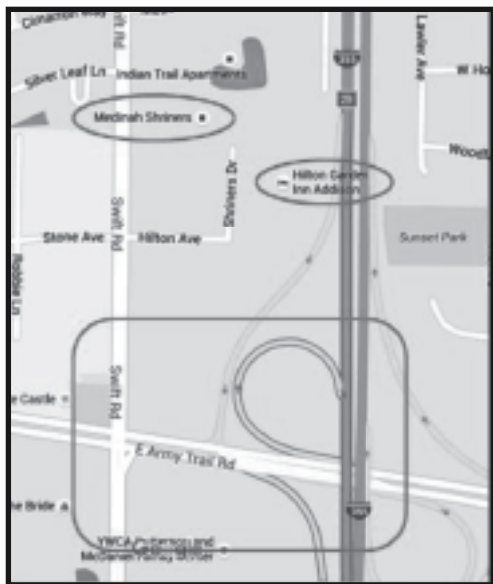

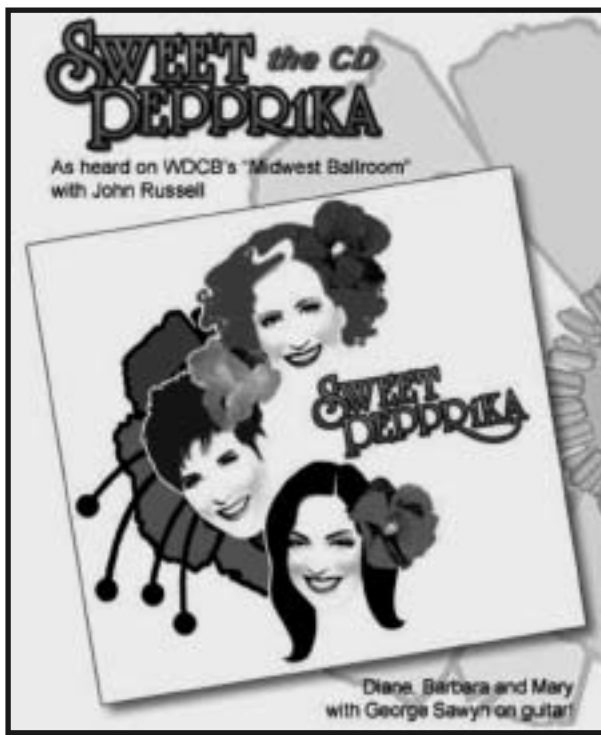

HISTORY ZONE

An Occasional Column on Topics of Historical Interest

HE MADE THE STRATOSPHERE BEAUTIFUL

Frank I. Johnson was born in Smoland, Nasjo, Sweden on April 2, 1879. He arrived in Rockford with his parents and little sister when he was three years old. He had a natural artistic talent which was obvious through childhood; Frank began working as a portrait painter for Rockford's Jackson Studio when he was still in high school. He continued there until 1904 when he opened his own artist's studio in downtown Rockford.

It was not long before he realized that furniture design was a much more lucrative business than portrait painting; and, clutching a few of his sketches, he obtained a new job and career at the Rockford Furniture Company. This successful new venture allowed him to marry Miss Lily Lundberg on June 30, 1914.

Radio cabinet manufacturing in Rockford increased with the growing popularity of radio and the public's desire to have them look like fine furniture, complimenting one's living room or parlor. Since he had no exclusivity restriction with Rockford Furniture, Frank began designing radio cabinets and furniture for several manufacturers—not just in Rockford, but also Chicago and Jamestown, New York. He completed radio cabinet designs for Rockford Cabinet Co. and Winnebago Manufacturing Corp. who both did a considerable amount of business with Zenith. Based on research done for this article, the author believes that Rockford Cabinet Co. built table model and smaller console cabinets for Zenith with Winnebago Manufacturing Corp.; concentrating on the higher end Zenith consoles. Frank did much of the design work for Winnebago and some of the table model design.

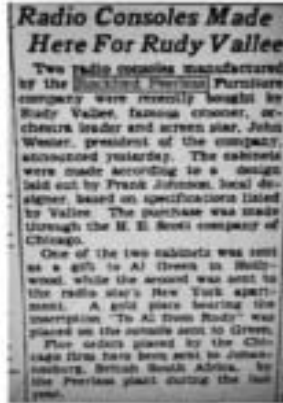
And ROCKFORD'S contribution, worthy of the highest recognition, goes to Mr. Frank I. Johnson, of this city, its cabinet designer, and to the Winnebago Manufacturing Co., Seymour St., Rockford, producers of this cabinet and all others that were on display.

And ZENITH RADIO CORPORATION of Chicago, the main factory of the radio, has further contributed by placing orders for over 200,000 cabinets which to date have given over 3,000,000 hours of steady employment for Rockford's wood workers and designers.

Frank also worked with Rockford Peerless Furniture Co, builders of most of the Scott, McMurdo Silver, and Lincoln cabinets. It is not known what input he had on these cabinet designs except Scott's Warwick Grande as seen in the following article excerpt.

Rudy Vallee Connection

According to a brief article published in a Rockford, Illinois newspaper, the cabinet was designed by Frank Johnson (probably of Rockford Peerless Furniture Company) "based on specifications listed by Vallee". The first two Warwick Grande cabinets were custom built for Rudy Vallee.



The Warwick Grande console with the gold plate bearing the inscription "To Al from Rudy" was located and purchased by radio collector Mike Sweeney in the mid-1970s. The spelling of Mr. Sweeney's name and the inscription quote by J.W.F. Puett are incorrect but the existence of the set in the Warwick Grande cabinet is undisputed and still in the hands of Mr. Sweeney at the time of this writing.

MY VISIT WITH MIKE SWEENEY

Mike Sweeney is one of the most resourceful classic radio collectors I have ever known. Mike lived in California in the Los Angeles area for a number of years where he tracked down many wealthy people who owned Scott radio receivers. Mike is now living in the state of Oklahoma and ranging over the southwest with his collecting. In the middle 1970's he walked into a dealership known as The Green Door Antiques and there it was ----- a Scott Albuve 19 in a Warwick Grande console! He was able to purchase this set, adding to his collection the only known Warwick Grande console as well as the only known Albuve 19. If you are not familiar with the Albuve 19, it is a special version of the Albuve 15, with the same tuner chassis, but with a special amplifier/power supply chassis. The interesting thing about Mike's set is that it was given to Rudy Vallee by his agent who was named Al. A plaque on the front of the console is inscribed "FROM AL TO RUDY." Mike did not stop at the acquisition of this set - he contacted Rudy Vallee and spent some time with him learning about the set and other Scott sets which Rudy Vallee had owned.

After the 1930s, very little is known about Frank's work in the furniture trade. He never lost his love for portrait painting. Most of his portraits include local clergymen and industrialists, particularly those who were philanthropic. Nearly all are head to toe portraits, not just the head or head and shoulders which are very common.

Frank had just completed his latest work, a full length portrait of well known and highly respected clergyman Dr. John Gordon, when he lost his balance while going down his basement stairs and fell to the cement floor below. He lingered in the hospital for less than a week until he passed away at the age of 73 on September 5, 1952.

Frank is buried in the family plot in Scandinavian Cemetery. The author lives less than a mile from the cemetery and from time to time will walk through it, stopping at Mr. Johnson's grave, paying silent homage to the man who designed the cabinet for what is probably the best known radio to collectors—the Zenith Stratosphere.

NEWS FROM THE HAMSHACK

LOOKING FOR SIGNALS WITH A PANADAPTER

AUTHOR'S NOTE: Before I begin this article, I would like to express my sincere thanks to Mike Lee, W7VAQ, of Sterling, VA who read my story about PolyComm in our December ARCI News and emailed me with some great info, which he found in an old 73 Magazine from April, 1962! Quoting from that article, "all of our technicians are very active hams". Their chief engineer was W2SXB and president was K2JXB. Mystery solved!

Back in the early 1960s when I was a young ham, most of us used either the Six or Ten Meter band (50 or 28 MHz) for local contacts – the 160 and 80 Meter bands (1.8 and 3.5 MHz) are also useful for talking with other locals, but require long antennas, not always possible in an urban setting – and some hams could not use those frequencies as their Technician Class licenses limited them to VHF and UHF.

The Ten and Six Meter bands cover a rather large amount of spectrum; 28.0 to 29.7 and 50 to 54 MHz although most Phone (voice) activity in the AM days was clustered between 50.1 to 50.4 and 28.5 to 29 MHz. There was not a lot of SSB (single sideband) operation back then, and most of us used the AM mode. Besides local QSOs, both bands also provide some good long distance QSOs as well during the Sporadic-E propagation seasons – with major peaks from May to July and a lesser cluster of openings from November through January. Worldwide DX is always a possibility during sunspot cycle peaks, especially on Ten Meters.

So how was one to find other stations with whom to talk? Tuning your receiver's band spread dial back and forth endlessly was one rather tiresome option. On Six Meters, 50.400 was the "calling and mobile" frequency, but some hams also monitored their local club's net frequencies such as 50.200, 50.280, 50.300, etc. A much easier and more sophisticated way to find activity was, and still is, by using a panadapter – panoramic receiving adapter – attached to one's receiver.

Panadapters were initially developed for our military and used during World War II, especially by the Navy. They were first introduced to hams shortly after the war by Hallicrafters, who marketed their SP-44. This was really a relabeled unit made by the Panoramic Radio Corp. of New York City that was also sold by PRC as their Model PCA-2. This little box is best described as a sort of receiving converter with video output displayed on a small CRT screen. It had a continuously variable oscillator that electronically tuned back and forth (“scanning”) over a small range of the spectrum, plus or minus a couple hundred of kc from the center frequency. Signals show up on the screen as “pips” of varying height, according to their signal strength.

I was given a Hallicrafters SP-44 by a friendly local ham who upgraded his station. He was reluctant to “dig into” his shiny brand new receiver to make the necessary modifications that would allow use of the unit. Basically, looking at your receiver’s schematic, you had to identify a suitable spot just before the receiver’s first IF stage to tap off a small amount of received signal through a coupling capacitor, and run a short length of small RG-58/u coax cable to the panadapter. The SP-44 was set up for use with receivers having a first IF of 455 kHz. This was perfect for my S-85 receiver. I really enjoyed using the unit. It was neat to watch little “pips” pop up above or beyond the center frequency that I would be monitoring, and I made a lot of contacts with help from my SP-44!

Later on, Heathkit presented hams with their version of the panadapter, dubbed the “Ham-Scan”. It survived in their product line for many years as a popular accessory. It was repackaged and refined over the years; first as the HO-13, later as the SB-620, and finally as the HA-5410-1 accessory that could be added to their HO-5404 Monitor Scope. Heath provided buyers of these units with the necessary interface parts – coils and capacitors – plus instructions to cover a variety of IF’s for many receivers of the era. Several other manufacturers of ham gear, including Kenwood and Squires-Sanders, marketed their version of the panadapter, but none were as popular as the Heathkits.

Today, panadapters live on for hams; several of the high-end HF/VHF multimode transceivers have panoramic reception built in with readout on their large video displays.
