

REGISTER EARLY FOR JUNE HAMFEST COMBINED MEET WITH SIX METER CLUB

The June ARCI swap meet will be a joint event with the Six Meter Club of Chicago on Sunday, June 18, 2017 at the DuPage County Fairgrounds, 2015 Manchester Rd., in Wheaton - just a bit south and west of our ARCI meets at the American Legion in Carol Stream. Last year more than 1,200 radio enthusiasts and hams from 16 states and with visitors from Canada and Mexico participated in the giant flea market and other events, including many ARCI members who were able to park in a special area designated as ARCI Swap Row.

We will have displays from AMSAT, ARRL, NWS/Skywarn and dealer displays. And, the Midwest Classic Radio Net's Hamboree will be back with us again. MCRN is a gathering of hams that operate "boat anchor" equipment on a weekly 3885 kHz AM net..





Everyone MUST have a Hamfest ticket to attend. Tickets are still only \$6 in advance, or \$8 at the gate. There is no charge for outdoor flea market space - please see the registration form for information. As usual, ARCI will have its donation auction at 10 am along with the 50-50 drawing. In addition, if you deposit your Hamfest ticket stubs in the drum near the stage in Building 2, you have a chance to win many other prizes including \$300, \$200 and \$100 cash.

Indoor flea market sellers and commercial dealers will be in Buildings 2, 3 and 4 with the outdoor flea market to the east of the Exhibition Hall building and extending north along the east side of the fairgrounds. All traffic will enter and exit through gate S-7 located east of the main exhibition hall. For ham operators, in honor of the club's 60th anniversary, special event station K6O will be on the air, serving as a talk-in station on two meter FM, 146.52 simplex and through the 146.37/97 repeater (107.2 Hz tone). Food, coffee and soda will be available from the Romeoville Knights of Columbus.

For anyone wishing to take an FCC Amateur Radio license exam, testing will be held from 9 to 11 am.

The Hamfest opens to the general public at 7 am (buildings at 8 am), but ARCI members who are willing to help direct traffic for parking — we will need help keeping ARCI Swap Row open for members — can enter at 6 a.m. providing you have an advance ticket and can show positive ARCI ID (your current membership card). You can then pick out your favorite flea market parking space and lend a hand for a few minutes when the gates open at 7. We could also use some help Saturday afternoon after 2 pm setting up signs, the PA system, tables, etc.

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of long time Michigan Antique Radio Club board member Don Colbert on April 26, 2017. He and his wife Nancy were pillars of MARC since the beginning in 1985. Don, 74, of Dearborn, passed away unexpectedly at Beaumont Oakwood hospital on Wednesday, April 26, 2017.

After surgery for cancer, Don passed away. He was one of the founding fathers of MARC, and he and wife Nancy attended and staffed nearly every event since 1985. Anyone who attended Extravaganza at Lansing more or recently in Kalamazoo probably met him. Don often acted as the "Security" at MARC events, and was known to be a firm wall to hit, but deep inside he was one of the warmest fellows you could know.

Don is survived by his wife Nancy, sons Michael (Tonnya), Matthew (Charlotte) and daughter Marcy (Charles Jerore). Grandfather to 12 grandchildren, 4 great grandchildren, uncle to many nieces and nephews, and great uncle to Macsen.

Don was born March 16, 1943 in Detroit, and was the oldest of two children. After graduating from high school in 1961, he proudly enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps and served in the Vietnam War. Following the war, Don became a driver for the United Parcel Service where he worked for 30 years before retiring.

Don was passionate about his antique radios, his handy man work, The Knights of Columbus, and volunteering. As a board member of MARC, he spent more than 35 years collecting, selling and restoring antique radios. He traveled to and hosted many antique radio events over the years, and he owned over 150 antique radios.

While enjoying his retirement, Don became a local handy man and helped as many people as he could. He was generous with his time and attention and a very caring individual. He was an active member of the Knight of Columbus where he served as a Warden and helped with the dinners at St. Patrick's Senior Center, the corned beef dinners at the hall and enjoyed having coffee with his friends many days during the week. He was a dedicated parishioner of Sacred Heart Church where he volunteered to deliver food

baskets during the Holidays, delivered donated coats and VA collections and served at the mother daughter brunches and pancake breakfasts.


Don will forever be known for his dedication to his family, passion for the Marine Corps., fun loving personality, generosity and his compassion for others.







NEWS FROM THE HAMSHACK

By Jim Novak, WA9FIH

SIDEBAND ENGINEERS' HF HAM TRANSCEIVERS

Several years ago we looked at the VHF and UHF radios manufactured by SBE – Sideband Engineers. This is the promised follow up describing their line of HF ham

gear. Hybrid ham transceivers were uncommon in the 1960s, to say the least. Prior to SBE's introduction of the SB-33 in 1963 with a list price of \$389.50, there was not much to choose from in transistorized ham gear, except for Hallicrafters' FPM-200 which sold for \$2,660 back in 1960!

The SBE-33 was a single sideband transceiver covering the phone (voice) portions of the amateur 75, 40, 20 and 15

Meter bands. Packaged in a sturdy blue gray painted steel case, the 15 pound radio had a built-in 110 Volt AC power supply, and measured about 11-3/4" W x 5-1/2" H x 10-1/4" D. It employed 19 transistors and three tubes, a 12DQ7 driver into a pair of PL500/27GB5 final amplifiers, and ran about 135 Watts PEP input. Optional accessories included VOX (voice operated transmit control), a 100 kc crystal calibrator, and a luggage type carrying case. It had an attractive brushed aluminum finish front panel with blue knobs and plastic bezel around the frequency dial. A companion 1000 Watt linear amplifier, the SB-1LA, was also available.

My first recollection of actually operating an SBE rig was at an ARRL Field Day event in the late 1960s, when one of the hams in our group brought out his SB-34, the next HF radio produced by SBE, which debuted in 1966 when the company had become part of Raytheon. The 34 had a handsome and more conventional charcoal grey and black finish covered essentially the same frequency range as the SB-33: 3775-4025, 7050-7300, 14100-14350, and 21200-21450 kc. It had a few more controls, including one labeled PITCH which was actually an RIT (Receiver Incremental Tuning) control, and internal power supplies for both 110 VAC and 12 VDC which made mobile operation easy. Both the SB-33 and -34 featured a Collins 2.1 kc mechanical filter for excellent receiver selectivity and high quality sideband transmission. Although it did not cover the entire CW (Morse Code) allocations, an optional SB2-CW Codapter was available which plugged into the microphone jack and provided connections for a key as well as break-in code operation. Once again a matching linear amplifier was offered, the model SB2-LA, using six 6JE6 sweep tubes.

Around 1970, the SB-35, a refined version of the SB-34, was advertised in the various ham magazines, but it was apparently never produced in any quantity. I have one, which I bought years ago at the Kane County Flea Market from a seller who had a truckload of "house clean out" items including a number of CB radios. Not much information

about the SB-35 is available other than what appeared in their ad, and I was told once by a California ham who lived in the town where SBE was manufactured that he understood that total production was less than 50 units, and it is unclear as to whether it was manufactured here or in Japan. It is about the same size as the SB-34, with an attractive white panel and black cabinet. Full coverage of the 80, 40, 20, 15, and 10 Meter bands (10 Meters in four 500 kc segments) is provided, and CW operation was built in.

The final piece of ham gear offered by SBE before they went bankrupt around 1979 was the early 1970s SB-36, made in Japan and also marketed in the United States as the Robyn 500 by Robyn International, well known CB and scanner radio importers. The SB-36 was a much larger radio, with an external power supply and speaker. It employed six tubes, 30 integrated circuits, and about 50 FETs and conventional transistors. Its readout consisted of six large red NIXIE tubes. Neither the SB-36 nor the Robyn 500 version appeared to have been very popular with the ham community, and signaled the end of an era for SBE. (Note: Some of the

NEWS ITEMS An Occasional Column on Topics of Interest By Keith Schreiter

RADIO TIMES BETWEEN 1923 AND 2009 IS NOW ONLINE

The BBC is making the earliest issues of the complete Radio Times magazines publicly available online for the first time. This release is part of the BBC Genome Project - a digitised searchable database of programme listings - from 1923 to the end of 2009.

BBC program records have been available to the public via the BBC Genome Project since October 2014. Now, users can access digitised editions of the magazines from 1923-1929. Opening up this archive means researchers will be able to make direct links between the listings in the database and the original published listings.

Early colour front covers, specially commissioned illustrations and letters from the BBC's first radio audience form part of the content in this fascinating record of early broadcasting.

Radio Times began in 1923, a year after the British Broadcasting Company started regular broadcasts, and thus provides a valuable record of the programmes that have been broadcast over nine decades.

More than five million program records, scanned from *Radio Times* magazines, form the backbone of the BBC Genome website. Now, members of the public will be able to view the 1920s listings in facsimile, as well as all the extra material contained in articles and features in the magazine that have previously been unavailable on the site.

Hilary Bishop, Archive Development Editor, says: "We are particularly pleased that it is easy for our users to flick between the listings in the database and the related text in the magazine, as well as to scroll through articles not seen previously on BBC Genome. It is part of the BBC's commitment to continually improving BBC Genome and helping to open up the BBC's archives as much as possible."

Radio Times in the 1920s featured regular articles by the first Director General of the BBC, Lord Reith, and the BBC's chief engineer, Peter Eckersley, addressing topics that concerned the BBC audience of the time, such as how to choose the best 'receiving set' and how to prevent 'oscillations' over the airwaves. Articles, cartoons and program listings all provide an insight into the history of broadcasting and the BBC's first listeners, while adding some context, for a modern audience, to the earliest BBC programme records. The first editions of Radio Times show a nation still enthralled by the technological wonder of the new 'wireless' sets. In each edition for the first few years of publication, cartoons explored the comic possibilities of a public who still didn't quite understand how radio worked. "Would you kindly remove your hat madam?" asks a man at a 'wireless village concert'. Yet the performer on stage is a radio set.

As the public wrestled with their new radio antennae, legendary cartoonist W. Heath Robinson illustrated two editions with eccentric designs of aerials. Other historical snippets include a 'new experiment', in 1924, to broadcast a program from California, to London. The exercise was to be repeated in the opposite direction. "If suitable conditions exist in the atmosphere", concludes the article, "there is no reason why the experiment should not be successful".



BIOGRAPHY ZONE An Occasional Column on People of Interest By Mike Stone WD9DAM

THE MYSTERY DEATH OF ZENITH RADIO HEIR

All of you have heard of Zenith Radio and may even have a couple in your collection, but there is a dark side to the Zenith saga. The story begins back in 1886 when Eugene McDonald was born in New York.

After moving to Chicago in 1910 he joined up with a friend to start an automotive company. The business failed and McDonald lost his investment. The following year he was selling used cars in Detroit. In 1912 he created a credit finance company for the purchase of new and used cars. He was the first to offer a payment plan for the workers when they would purchase an automobile. He enlisted in the Navy during World War I and became a Lieutenant Commander. McDonald formed Zenith Radio in 1923 after the war with two other men. The company survived the great depression and soon became

the leader of radio manufacturing

McDonald had two children. A son, Eugene McDonald III was known as 'Stormy' and a daughter Jean Marianne McDonald. Eugene McDonald Sr. passed away on May 15, 1958. His company Zenith continued on.

The next part of the story will focus on the son also named Eugene McDonald. Not much has been written about him since he died at the early

age of 23. The official cause of death on February 3, 1965 by the sheriff was suicide, but there is heavy skepticism about his death.

Stormy married Virginia Baker in 1964, but the marriage only lasted two months. He was president of Pando Corporation, a company that entered stock cars and drag strip cars into events in Tucson. He owned a variety of racing cars, motorboats and a twin engine Cessna 310 that he used for business. McDonald also had a vast collection of guns that he knew very well.

He was renting a house at 9043 E Bellevue Street in Chicago at the time of his death. He lived alone at the time of death, but did have an ex roommate, John

Haeberlin. Eugene's relationship with John was strained. John could not afford to pay the \$100 per month share of the rent when he lived with McDonald.

McDonald III inherited \$30 million from his father. He seemed to lead a fun, fast, open lifestyle at the time of his death. The question that some asked is 'Why would he commit suicide?'

Others thought he was deeply depressed because of his short failed marriage. He was close friends with actor Peter Fonda. Fonda was older, but they still had a lot in common and had fun together. Fonda thought Mcdonald did not commit suicide. Fonda said that McDonald was always looking forward to things in life.

McDonald was found by his business associate in a hallway of the house he rented. All of the doors were locked and curtains pulled closed. He was only clothed with slacks on. Yet, Stormy usually never locked the doors and kept the curtains open. His wrists were slit and a bath of bloody water was found.

The official cause of death was a bullet from a .22 caliber pistol to the back of the head. He had the .22 caliber still in his hand at time of his death. Pathologist Ed Brucker was puzzled why there was blood in places in the house but no blood on his trousers. If he slit his wrists wouldn't there be blood in his trousers?

Just a week before his death he was vacationing in Hawaii with Fonda and phoned his residence. He was surprised that his ex roommate was in his home while he was away according to his housekeeper who overheard his conversation in the house. The housekeeper would clean and cook for Stormy.

Some close friends still say that his inheritance did not buy him happiness. The mystery still remains for all these decades. Was McDonald so deeply depressed he killed himself or a homicide?
