

REGISTER EARLY FOR JUNE HAMFEST COMBINED MEET WITH SIX METER CLUB

The June ARCI swap meet will be a joint event with the Six Meter Club of Chicago on Sunday, June 21, 2015 at the DuPage County Fairgrounds, 2015 Manchester Rd., in Wheaton - just a bit south and west of our ARCI meets at the American Legion in Carol Stream. Enter through Gate S-7 on the far, east side of the fairgrounds. Last year more than 1,200 radio enthusiasts and hams from 16 states and even two visitors from Japan participated in the giant flea market and other events, including many ARCI members who were able to park in a special area designated as ARCI Swap Row.

We will have displays from AMSAT, ARRL, NWS/Skywarn and commercial dealers. And, the Midwest Classic Radio Net's *Hamboree* will be back with us again. MCRN is a gathering of hams that operate "boat anchor" equipment on a weekly 3885 kHz AM net.





Everyone MUST have a Hamfest ticket to attend. Tickets are still only \$6 in advance, or \$8 at the gate. There is no charge for outdoor flea market space - please see the registration form for information. As usual, ARCI will have its donation auction at 10 am along with the 50-50 drawing. In addition, if you deposit your Hamfest ticket stubs in the drum near the stage in Building 2, you have a chance to win many other prizes including \$300, \$200 and \$100 cash.

Indoor flea market sellers and commercial dealers will be in Buildings 2, 3 and 4 with the outdoor flea market to the east of the Exhibition Hall building and extending north along the east side of the fairgrounds. All traffic will enter and exit through gate S-7 located east of the main exhibition hall. For ham operators, station K9ONA will be on the air, serving as a talk-in station on two meter FM, 146.52 simplex and through the 146.37/97 repeater (107.2 Hz tone). Food, coffee and soda will be available from the Romeoville Knights of Columbus.

For anyone wishing to take an FCC Amateur Radio license exam, testing will be held from 9 to 11 am.

The Hamfest opens to the general public at 7 am (buildings at 8 am), but ARCI members who are willing to help direct traffic for parking – we will need help keeping ARCI Swap Row open for members – can enter at 6 a.m. providing you have an advance ticket and can show positive ARCI ID (your current membership card). You can then pick out your favorite flea market parking space and lend a hand for a few minutes when the gates open at 7. We could also use some help Saturday afternoon after 2 pm setting up signs, the PA system, tables, etc.





The Main Auction will take place on Friday evening in the ARIA Ballroom, with a starting time of 6:30 PM. Check-in for the Main Auction will open at 3:30pm. Sellers will be able to unload their items for auction in the rear of the hotel for easy access to the ballroom until 6:00PM on Friday. The ballroom is also accessible from the hotel lobby, and sellers can carry in smaller items for the auction through the hotel's front

entrance. Parking in the rear hotel lot will be available only to pre-registered *Radiofest* attendees who have purchased a seller's space with their parking permit prominently displayed in their vehicle's windshield. Vehicles must be parked only in their assigned spots. No exceptions. 



NEWS FROM THE HAMSHACK

A LOOK AT KNIGHTKIT'S 1960s NOVICE STATION


Back in the 1960s all Amateur Radio operators began their career with the FCC's Novice Class license, a non-renewable one year (later changed to two years) authorization to operate CW (Morse code) crystal controlled in small segments of the 80, 40, and 15 Meter ham bands with a power input of 75 Watts or less. Novices were also given limited voice privileges in the 145-147 MHz portion of our two meter band. In order to stay on the air after their life as a Novice, it was necessary to upgrade to either the Technician Class (50 MHz and up, 5 words per minute CW proficiency) or General Class (all HF and VHF/UHF bands, 13 WPM CW exam required).

Hallicrafters, Heathkit and Allied Radio's Knightkit offered transmitter-receiver combinations suitable for Novice licensees. Hallcrafters' HT-40 transmitter and SX-140 receiver were available as either kits or factory wired, and covered ham bands only, 80 through 6 meters. Heathkit's station consisted of the DX-60 transmitter and HR-10 receiver; Knightkit had the T-60 transmitter and R-55A receiver; and EICO just sold transmitters – either the larger model 720 or the more compact 723. Unlike Heathkit and EICO, whose gear only covered the HF bands through ten meters, Allied's gear emulated Halllicrafters, including the six meter (50-54 MHz) band which was an attraction for those Novices who earned Technician licenses with their more modest code requirement.

The T-60 transmitter, offered from about 1963 through 1967, was housed in a low profile cabinet and used four tubes, including a 6DQ6B final output tube running about 60 Watts input and having an output of about 35-40 Watts except on six meters, where it doubled in the final stage and had an output of around 15-20 Watts. A controlled carrier AM screen modulator was built in. Most tube type transmitters of the era had final grid and plate metering, but the T-60 had a simple "tune for max" RF output meter instead. Two sockets on the front panel are provided for plugging in a crystal or VFO. My T-60 appears to meet Knight's general specifications, has decent sounding "galloping modulation" as we used to call it, and is easy to tune up and operate although push-to-talk was not provided; changeover between transmit and receive is by rotation of the function switch. As with most rigs of the era, an external coax relay is required for switching the antenna from transmitter to receiver.

The six tube Knightkit R-55A receiver was, in my opinion, better suited as a radio meant for casual short wave listening rather than looking for weak CW signals in the often crowded ham bands. Unlike the ham bands only HR-10 and SX-140 which had relatively slow tuning and decent bandspread, the R-55A was general coverage, with five bands covering 530 Kc to 36 Mc plus 47-54 Mc with calibrated bandspread in the ham bands. Single conversion, with an IF frequency of 1650 Kc, selectivity was not great. And although the six meter band is 50-54 Mc, virtually all AM activity back in the day was between 50.1-50.5 – we mostly monitored 50.4 as the mobile and calling frequency.

How would I rate the Knight Novice pair? The T-60 merits an A- or B+ --doubling in the final (eliminating one doubler driver stage saved a little money) makes it rather inefficient on six meters. And the mic connector, in the lower left area of the front panel, is a simple RCA phono jack rather than a pricier Amphenol threaded connector. But otherwise, it is not a bad How would I rate the Knight Novice pair? The T-60 merits an A- or B+ --doubling in the final (eliminating one

doubler driver stage saved a little money) makes it rather inefficient on six meters. And the mic connector, in the lower left area of the front panel, is a simple RCA phono jack rather than a pricier Amphenol threaded connector. But otherwise, it is not a bad first transmitter from that time frame. The receiver is another story. The old saying, "If you can't hear them, you can't work them" applies, and I often wonder how many young inexperienced Novice operators gave up because of their inadequate receiver! My R-55A gets a C or C- rating (only because I was in a generous mood while writing this).

By the way, when I began operating on six meter AM back in the fall of 1962, my receive set up was an AMECO tube type converter with an output on the twenty meter (14.0-14.5) band of my good old Hallicrafters S-85 receiver, great sensitivity for the day and decent bandspread and frequency readout (no digital displays back then!). We will take a closer look at the Hallicrafters and Heathkit Novice stations in subsequent columns.



HIRAM PERCY MAXIM'S HAM RADIO STATION IN 1915

[Reprinted from The Radiogram, Vol. 1, No. 2 - June 1915]

Two aerials are arranged, one for sending on 200 meter wave length for distances less than ten miles, and one for sending on 495 meter wave length for distances in excess of ten miles. Five plates of the condenser are used for the 200-meter wavelength and ten plates added to this five for the 425-meter wavelength. The outdoor equipment consists of a 60-ft. mast at one end and a 50-ft. mast at the other, 100 ft. apart. The spreaders are 18 ft. long and have 11 wire of stranded copper between them. The ground connection is carefully soldered and connected to ground at three places. This station can work points in southern New Jersey, northern Massachusets and can receive Colon, Panama and ships at sea, when two or three days out of New York. The station holds a special license for the purpose of relay work in the American Radio Relay League. The call letters are IZM.

The receiving station outfit consists of a large loose coupler by means of which I can get very accurate tuning, an Audion Detector and variable condenser. The two sets of phones are usually connected in. The Transmitting sets consists of a 1 K. W. specially made transformer, glass plate condenser, oscillation transformer, ¼ H. P. General Electric Company motor running specially built quenched rotary spark-gap.

GHOSTLY VOICES FROM THOMAS EDISON'S DOLLS <u>CAN NOW BE HEARD</u>

Though Robin and Joan Rolfs owned two rare talking dolls manufactured by Thomas Edison's phonograph company in 1890, they did not dare play the wax cylinder records tucked inside each one.

The Rolfses, longtime collectors of Edison phonographs, knew that if they turned the cranks on the dolls' backs, the steel phonograph needle might damage or destroy the grooves of the hollow, ring-shaped cylinder. And so for years, the dolls sat side by side inside a display cabinet; bearers of a message from the dawn of sound recording that nobody could hear.




Edison doll, sans clothing, showing the body housing the sound reproducing mechanism.

In 1890, Edison's dolls were a flop; production lasted only six weeks. Children found them difficult to operate and more scary than cuddly. The recordings inside, which featured snippets of nursery rhymes, wore out quickly.

Yet sound historians say the cylinders were the first entertainment records ever made, and the young girls hired to recite the rhymes were the world's first recording artists.

Year after year, the Rolfses asked experts if there might be a safe way to play the recordings. Then a government laboratory developed a method to play fragile records without touching them.

The technique relies on a microscope to create images of the grooves in exquisite detail. A computer approximates — with great accuracy — the sounds that would have been created by a needle moving through those grooves.

In 2014, the technology was made available for the first time outside the laboratory.

"The fear all along is that we don't want to damage these records. We don't want to put a stylus on them," said Jerry Fabris, the curator of the Thomas Edison Historical Park in West Orange, N.J. "Now we have the technology to play them safely."

Last month, the Historical Park posted online three never-before-heard Edison doll recordings, including the two from the Rolfses' collection. "There are probably more out there, and we're hoping people will now get them digitized," Mr. Fabris said.

The technology, which is known as Irene (Image, Reconstruct, Erase Noise, Etc.), was developed by the particle physicist Carl Haber and the engineer Earl Cornell at Lawrence Berkeley. Irene extracts sound from cylinder and disk records. It can also reconstruct audio from recordings so badly damaged they were deemed unplayable.

"We are now hearing sounds from history that I did not expect to hear in my lifetime," Mr. Fabris said.

The Rolfses said they were not sure what to expect in August when they carefully packed their two Edison doll cylinders, still attached to their motors, and drove from their home in Hortonville, Wis., to the Northeast Document Conservation Center in Andover, Mass. The center had recently acquired Irene technology.

Cylinders carry sound in a spiral groove cut by a phonograph recording needle that vibrates up and down, creating a surface made of tiny hills and valleys. In the Irene set-up, a microscope perched above the shaft takes thousands of high-resolution images of small sections of the grooves.

Stitched together, the images provide a topographic map of the cylinder's surface, charting changes in depth as small as one five-hundredth the thickness of a human hair. Pitch, volume and timbre are all encoded in the hills and valleys and the speed at which the record is played.

At the conservation center, the preservation specialist Mason Vander Lugt attached one of the cylinders to the end of a rotating shaft. Huddled around a computer screen, the Rolfses first saw the wiggly waveform generated by Irene. Then came the digital audio. The words were at first indistinct, but as Mr. Lugt filtered out more of the noise, the rhyme became clearer.

"That was the Eureka moment," Mr. Rolfs said.

In 1890, a girl in Edison's laboratory had recited:

There was a little girl,
And she had a little curl
Right in the middle of her forehead.
When she was good,
She was very, very good.
But when she was bad, she was horrid.

Recently, the conservation center turned up another surprise.

In 2010, the Woody Guthrie Foundation received 18 oversize phonograph disks from an anonymous donor. No one knew if any of the dirt-stained recordings featured Guthrie, but Tiffany Colannino, then the foundation's archivist, had stored them unplayed until she heard about Irene.

Last fall, the center extracted audio from one of the records, labeled "Jam Session 9" and emailed the digital file to Ms. Colannino.

"I was just sitting in my dining room, and the next thing I know, I'm hearing Woody," she said. In between solo performances of "Ladies Auxiliary,"

"Jesus Christ," and "Dead or Alive," Guthrie tells jokes, offers some back story, and makes the audience laugh. "It is quintessential Guthrie," Ms. Colannino said.

The Rolfses' dolls are back in the display cabinet in Wisconsin. But with audio stored on several computers, they now have a permanent voice.



SPRAGUE ELECTRIC: AN ELECTRONIC GIANT'S RISE, FALL, AND LIFE AFTER DEATH By John L. Sprague

The rise of the Sprague Electric Company from a high-tech kitchen-table startup is representative of much of the U.S. electronics industry. Sprague Electric 1926 in the Massachusetts kitchen of a young naval officer, Ensign Robert C. Sprague, and became a thriving manufacturer employing thousands of workers. Its broad product line of electronic components achieved international sales and a reputation for the highest quality. The company later declined, went through a series of acquisitions, and eventually dissolved.
