RADIOFEST 2022 UPDATE

Radiofest 2022

Friday August 5 – Saturday August 6 Medinah Shriners 550 N. Shriners Drive Addison, IL 60101

RADIOFEST IS BACK! We were hoping to print those words in 2020 and 2021 ...but like so many other social events in that time frame, it was not to be. We are now on track and anxious for everyone to "reconnect" at Radiofest 2022 and experience the same great schedule of events we all look forward to at Radiofest! August 5th and 6th is around the corner...so be sure to pre-register now for bargain-priced selling spaces and banquet tickets.

LOCATION: We will return to the spacious and beautifully maintained **Medinah Shriners in Addison, Illinois.** This modern, upscale facility is across from a **Hilton Garden Inn**. The Medinah Shriners is located at the junction of I-355 and Army Trail Road in Addison, Illinois. This is a very convenient location that can be accessed from all directions within the entire Chicago area.

HOTEL: Our official hotel for *Radiofest 2022* is the Hilton Garden Inn, located directly adjacent to the Medinah Shriners complex, and is a very short walk from the banquet facilities and parking lots. Medinah Shriners and Hilton Garden Inn are completely independent entities, but they coordinate closely on events. Once again, the hotel has set aside a block of rooms for *Radiofest 2022* attendees at \$99 per night. This is a really nice hotel at a great price. You will not be disappointed! Or, you can call the hotel at: 630-691-0500. Mention "RADIO GROUP" to the friendly reservation agent to get the special discount rate. *Note that reservations must be received at the hotel by July 22, 2022 to receive our special rate.*

EVENTS SCHEDULE

You can participate in our world-class auction on Friday night and experience the always-anticipated giant open-air swap meet on Saturday. Also on Saturday is the popular all-day donation sale/auction, special event ham station WA9RCI, and educational programs topped off by a sellers raffle at 2:15 pm and the evening banquet. *Refer to the specific event details found elsewhere in this ARCI NEWS*.

STREAMLINED REGISTRATION PROCESS

Radiofest is our flagship event with high expectations from attendees. This requires

an incredible amount of effort from a shrinking volunteer base to maintain. We are, therefore, implementing streamlined processes to best utilize our existing resources. We have established on-line registration, with price incentives for registration and parking spaces, compared to the familiar mail-in procedure. Mail-in registration, however, is still an option, if desired. Assigning and tracking parking spots was found to be very time-consuming so we elected to try a "first-come-first-served" procedure for parking spots this year. A "Registration Form" can be found in another section of this issue showing price details and registration instructions. Note: Online pre-registration is instantaneous, but if you decide to use "snail mail", your envelope must be postmarked by July 15, 2022 by mail or July 29, 2022 on-line. On-site day of swap meet fees are higher.

OUTDOOR SWAP AREA

The swap meet will again be located in its own large parking lot at the west end of the facility. There will be plenty of seller spaces available with lots of room between rows for maneuvering a small truck or a vehicle with a trailer. The sellers' lot is also totally out of the main traffic flow, which is good for those walking around the swap meet. Parking in this lot will be available only to sellers and attendees who have already purchased selling spaces or will do so on site. All sellers are required to check in at the registration area. Directly adjacent to the sellers' lot is the main parking lot, with plenty spaces available for buyers and visitors. It is an easy walk from one lot to the other.

IMPORTANT! NO TENT STAKES ALLOWED IN THE SWAP MEET LOT. Our agreement with the Medinah Shriners strongly stipulates that no tent stakes will be used in the swap meet lot. This rule will be strictly enforced by ARCI.

NO ELECTRONICS DISPOSAL: Radiofest attendees cannot dispose of electronics onsite. The Illinois EPA has substantially tightened the rules regarding disposal of electronics items in state landfills. We are required to keep regular trash and electronic waste separate at the meet. This means no electronics may be placed in our trash containers. We therefore ask for your cooperation on the following: Do not use our area at Radiofest for any electronics you simply intend to throw away. We cannot accommodate such items and they should not be brought to Radiofest. Items to be placed in our donation auction should have a reasonable possibility of being useful to another collector. In other words, please exercise discretion when placing items in the auction pile. If you do not believe anyone will really want it, then please do not put it in the auction. We will be monitoring the donation auction area carefully, and ARCI does reserve the right to reject any item that we do not deem acceptable for the donation auction. We thank you in advance for your cooperation in this important matter.

RESTROOM FACILITIES: Outside restroom facilities will be provided, conveniently located near the middle of the parking lot along the West side of the sellers lot. Indoor restroom facilities will also be available through the front

entrance to the Shriners building.

TRASH CONTAINERS: Trash receptacles for general refuse will be provided in the parking area. Please do not place any electrical items these receptacles.

FOOD ITEMS FOR PURCHASE: The Shriners plan on providing a variety of food items for purchase at reasonable prices on Saturday. The Hotel will also serve food throughout most of the course of the event. Logistics prohibit ARCI from providing free drinks or snacks at our fest. However, it can get hot outside, so you may want pack drinks and snacks yourself and bring them with you to the swap meet.

AUCTION

The opening night auction will be in the Medinah Crescent Ballroom. The large quantity and excellent quality of items available in the auction make this a "must attend" event. You never know what you will find, including rare and highly collectible items. Jim Sargent from VRPS is returning as auctioneer. See the excellent article on Auction Information & Rules by John Stone elsewhere in this issue.

DONATIONS

The usual donation auction will be held at 2:30 pm on Saturday. Keep in mind that you may purchase donated items throughout the day without having to wait for the actual donation auction. Either way, your purchase will likely be a bargain!

BANOUET

Banquet tickets are priced at \$40 per person and are available by pre-registration only. The food is always superb and it is a great way to close out *Radiofest* with your friends. **Note: Tickets must be purchased by July 15, 2022 by mail or July 29, 2022 on-line.**

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

Two great programs are scheduled for Saturday. Programs will be held at 11 am and 1 pm with a break during the noon hour. The programs will include setting up a vintage audio repair bench and the Bill Ross memorial Ham Forum with a focus on a century of receiver development to mitigate noise. Both programs will take place in the Shriners "MUSIC ROOM". *Please see the separate pages in this issue for the presentation details*.

VOLUNTEERS: We need volunteers at *Radiofest*. Those that have volunteered in the past expressed that they enjoyed helping out. They met new collectors and learned a little bit about vintage radio along the way. Let me know if you are interested (smuchow@att.net).

ARCI RADIOFEST 2022 MAIN AUCTION

Friday Night, August 5th

Thanks to John Stone, ARCI Auction Coordinator, for submitting the following auction planning update.

We are pleased to announce that, after a long 2-year hiatus, the ARCI Main Auction will return as the opening event for *Radiofest* 2022. It will be held in the Crescent Ballroom of the Medinah Shriners facility, with an official starting time of 6 PM. Seller registration will open no later than 3:00 pm and close at 5:30 pm, or when we have reached the maximum of 260 registered lots, whichever comes first. After such a long break, we anticipate a very busy and well attended event, and we suggest you allow as much time as possible to register and place your items. Sellers will be able to unload their items through the front entrance of the Medinah facility. The Crescent Ballroom is easily accessible from the front entrance, but we strongly suggest you bring your own hand truck or rolling cart with you, if you are bringing heavy or oversized items. Ample parking for buyers and sellers will be available in the lot directly in front of the facility.

The ARCI auction is a unique event, made possible through the joint efforts of generous volunteers from 5 different radio clubs around the country. We are once again privileged to have Jim Sargent, professional auctioneer and president of VPRS in Irving, TX, to call our auction. Jim's unique skills as an expert auctioneer, along with his in-depth knowledge of vintage radios and audio equipment will make for an enjoyable and exciting evening. Backing up Jim's efforts will be Nicholas Tillich, president of the Wisconsin Antique Radio Club. Nick and his crew will handle the critical job of registering all items up for auctions, and then updating and tracking their status throughout the auction process.

Fees are unchanged from the previous auction, and are as follows: \$7 per item for sellers (\$10 for non-members), bidding cards at \$3 each (\$5 for non-members) and a 10% buyer's premium applies. There is an 8 lot limit per seller, along with a total auction lot limit of 260, to keep the auction from running more than 4 hours. Registration will close either at 5:30 PM or when the maximum limit has been reached, whichever comes first.

Food and beverage service (alcoholic and non-alcoholic) is once again planned to be available throughout the duration of the auction, with cash and credit cards accepted.

Auction Rules



- Official auction registration hours: 3:00 PM to 5:30 PM, or when the total number of registered lots reaches 260, whichever comes first.
- Auction begins at 6:00 PM.
- 8 lots maximum per registered seller.
- Auction fees: \$7 per item for sellers (\$10 for non-members); bidding cards at \$3 each (\$5 for non-members); 10% buyer's premium applies.
- Auction sequence is based on numbered tables and floor areas, beginning with Table #1.
- Vintage Radio, Audio, Ham Radio, Phonograph, and items related to
 these categories only. (Advertising, parts, etc.) No new items allowed.
 No fans, clocks, or other small appliances, except those clearly intended
 for the purpose of marketing the items listed above. ARCI reserves the
 right to refuse any item presented at auction registration that does not
 meet the listed criteria.
- Cash or personal check only for all auction purchases and fees.
- Please hold unnecessary conversation to a minimum while the auction is in progress.

RADIOFEST 2022 logistics

The ARCI club officers and volunteers look forward to your participation in our premier club event. We hope you have a truly memorable experience. The Medinah Shriners have provided us with a spacious and beautifully maintained facility for our event. The Hilton Garden Inn is conveniently located on the same campus. You can walk right from your hotel room to the festivities. ARCI *Radiofest* volunteers have worked closely with the Shriners to provide you with the most pleasant and enjoyable *Radiofest* experience possible. Please read through the information below and follow the guidelines closely. Your cooperation is important, and always greatly appreciated.

The sellers' parking lot is located on the far west side of the Shriners facility, directly adjacent to Swift Road. Parking in this lot will be available only to sellers and attendees who have already purchased selling spaces or do so on site. The parking lot located directly in front of the facility and adjacent to the sellers' lot will have ample parking spaces for *Radiofest* attendees. After you enter the Shriners complex from Swift Road onto Hilton Drive, you will take the first left to gain access to the sellers' lot, which will be on your left. There are three entrances into the lot, but only the middle entrance will be open for access to the lot during registration. The registration area will be located immediately on your right as you pull into the middle entrance. All sellers are required to check in at the registration area to pick up nametags, tickets and *Radiofest* handouts prior to parking.

IMPORTANT! NO TENT STAKES ALLOWED IN THE SWAP MEET LOT.

Outside restroom facilities will be provided, conveniently located near the middle of the parking lot along the West side of the sellers' lot. Indoor restrooms are available through the front entrance to the Shriners building, and are located directly across from the ballroom, on the left side of the lobby.

Trash receptacles for general refuse will be provided in the parking area. Please do not place any electrical items in these receptacles. Electronics recycling is strictly limited to unsold items from the donation sale and auction. Due to tight Illinois environmental regulations, no electronic junk will be accepted for general disposal at *Radiofest*. There is a cost to the club to dispose of electronic waste. Therefore, the donation team may ask you to retrieve an unsold item at the end of the auction or reject certain items. Our goal is to preserve and re-home as many artifacts as possible. Once it is recycled it is not retrievable.

The Shriners plan on providing a variety of food items for purchase at reasonable prices during Friday's auction and Saturday's swap meet. Bar service is available at the Friday auction too. The Hotel will also serve food throughout the course of our event. Don't forget you must pre-register for the banquet on Saturday night. It can get hot in the outdoor lots, so you may want to pack drinks and snacks yourself and bring them with you to the swap meet.

A Bad Reputation?

I have a Masters degree in engineering but have spent most of my professional life in marketing; over 23 years here at Analog Devices. Though ADI is a global leader in the manufacture of semiconductor solutions for signal processing, I am inexorably drawn to earlier tech - specifically vacuum tubes - thanks to my hobby of restoring antique radios. I have found that stories of advancements and failures in old tech can provide lessons for both the engineer and marketer of today's high-tech products. Today I look at how a bad (perhaps undeserved) reputation was born, spread, and survived for eighty years...


It was 1940, and the folks at the Zenith Radio Corporation of Chicago Illinois had every reason to be proud of their newest consumer radio. The floor model 8S463 was a real Art Deco beauty, crafted in the finest wood and finished with a high gloss lacquer which seemed to make the radio glow even when turned off.



For their \$70 (about \$1300 today) consumers could do more than just listen to their favorite AM station. The Zenith 8S463 also had a shortwave band so they could hear the latest news directly from the countries involved in the European war. It also included the police band, at the time located just above AM. A phono jack on the back of the chassis allowed for an audio feed from a phonograph or the latest technological marvel, then in limited use: television.

\$70 also brought a potential disaster into thousands of American homes.

First, a quick lesson on tube radio power supplies. Tube radios need both AC (alternating current) and DC (direct current) to operate. Some of the AC is used to heat filaments in the tubes. Cathodes, heated by the filaments, give off electrons when hot, providing a source of negatively charged electrons. Positive DC voltage – often 400 volts or higher – is needed for the plates of the tubes to provide a path for the electrons from the cathodes. Both the DC and AC must first pass through the power transformer, circled in red below.



We are just warming up – literally. As we see in the "WARTIME" service bulletin (see image 3-next page), Zenith had been hearing from the field that transformers in the 8S463 (as well as a few other models) had a troubling propensity to heat up. Before you could say "Little Orphan Annie" they would smoke, and then fail.

If customers were lucky, the wires inside the transformer would burn out open. It wasn't cheap, but then all they'd have to do is call a serviceman to install a new transformer (a more robust one, suggested Zenith.) But, if they were not so lucky, wires inside would fuse together and short the transformer. This either blew a house fuse or, if the owner was really unlucky, short B+ (high voltage going to the plates) to ground. Kiss the tubes and other components goodbye.

space because of the various shapes of shells used; we might say here though that quite a number of transferences are interchangeable by simply removing the old shell and using it on the new assembly, so that mounting haps and holes will match.

(IMPORTANT PARTS AND TUBES SUBSTITUTION INFO.)

Service Shorts


The burning out of the power transformers in the sets using the 6X5 tubes has been kept at a minimum by wiring in a dial light in each plate lead of the secondary of the transformer. These should be of the 1/4amp, or .15 amp, size depending on the drain of the set. They glow very slightly under normal conditions but will burn out immediately upon the short-circuiting of either of the rectifier tubes. Some servicemen located in the rural districts have even put in sockets for these panel bulbs making it possible to replace them without removing the chassis and enabling the owner to replace both the rectifier tubes and the bulbs in case of trouble. We have found that these panel bulbs work much better than fuses either in the primary or high-voltage circuit as they stand temporary overloads without burning out and yet will open the circuit when shorted out. To the best of my knowledge, we have never lost a transformer the second time when these bulbs have been put in when the transformer was changed.

In the service bulletin (above) Zenith subtly intimates a problem with the 6X5 rectifier tube. "The burning out of the power transformers in the sets <u>using</u> the 6X5 tubes has been kept at a minimum by wiring in a dial light in each plate lead..." Suggesting the use of dial lights as fuses was not a bad idea. An excess of current flowing from the transformer would overheat and open the bulb's filament. This open would stop current from flowing, preventing the transformer from shorting. Problem solved, right? Well, not if you read on to the part where Zenith says "...we have never lost a transformer the second time... when the transformer was changed."

So, was there a problem with the transformer? Not really. It was a perfectly fine transformer but the folks at Zenith had put it into in a circuit requiring way more current than it was designed to handle. But, as we already saw, Zenith was then quick to throw a little shade on the tube by recommending the installation of dial bulbs "...in the sets using the 6X5 tubes." So now we're back to the tube. Was there a problem with the 6X5? The answer is... not so definitive.

Some say the 6X5 was a disaster waiting to happen, in part because of the physical construction of the tube in which the filament and the cathode which it is heating are spaced too close together. If (and, some say, when) a high voltage breakdown of the aluminum oxide occurs the 6X5 would fail AS A SHORT, not as an open - the filament/heater and the cathode simply fuse together. Within time the B+

also shorts to ground and that's when disaster strikes inside the radio. This might explain why Zenith recommended both a transformer replacement and dial light bulbs in series to protect the circuit - not from the transformer but the 6X5.



But is the 6X5 really deserving of, as one hobbyist wrote "...possibly the most universally-reviled type in all of tubedom?" Lots of other rectifier tubes have similar configurations in which the cathode is indirectly heated by a filament but none have gained such enmity. Subsequent versions of the 6X5 (released with different arrangements of the three elements) seemed to justify the concern. Known as a "Ruggedized" tube, it features plates in a "Figure 8" pattern as well as a wider spacing between the filament and cathode. Did this solve the problem? Depends who you ask. A couple of years ago, when I finally got around to restoring the piece, I found the debate over the 6X5 tube still raging today. Here are just a few of the opposing viewpoints posted on the Antique Radios website:

"The late production 6X5GT's had some design improvements, but I still don't trust them. There is no way I would put a 6X5G in ANYTHING."

"I've never had a problem with a 6X5 as long as it is operated well within its limits. In the 1940's, Zenith had a problem with the 6X5 because of an undersized power transformer and running the tubes at their limits or above..."

"I don't think ... the marginal transformers in Zenith radios causes a 6X5 to short, the transformer is under rated [and] a short in the 6X5 tube quickly kills the transformer."

The argument for/against either transformer or tube is further complicated by an increase in voltage fed into the typical American home. In the 140 years since

the distribution of AC began (see my piece on the <u>great battle between Edison</u>, <u>Westinghouse</u>, <u>and Tesla</u>) line voltage has steadily increased:


1883: 110v
1920s: 112v
1930s: 115v
WW2: 117v

Today: 121v to 122v

Higher line voltage, an under-rated transformer, and a flawed rectifier tube add up to a bigger-than-usual challenge for today's Zenith radio restorers like me. **What combination of modifications would provide for safe operation of the set?** Replace the hated 6X5 tube with diodes? Install a beefier transformer? What I decided to do was keep the transformer but make changes to mitigate (but not repair) the aforementioned concerns.

My Approach:

- 1. Add a 25-ohm 50-watt finned resistor on the hot leg of the AC input to mitigate the rise in voltage from 115v to 122v
- 2. Replace the 6X5 with a "ruggedized" tube to greatly reduce the chance of filament/cathode shorting
- 3. Fuse both AC in and the transformer's center tap out, in case either the #1 or #2 change fails (belt & suspenders!)



In the Boston area we have an AM radio station (740 WJIB) which, on Sunday afternoons, plays "crooners and Big Band" music appropriate for this pre-war Zenith. I have confidence that for the few hours a week I play my beautiful Zenith it is safe to do so. I hope I sound this good when I'm 80 years old.

My Grandpa's Radio

March 27, 2022 This is my grandpa, Harry A. Kowski. He was the proud owner of a 1934 E.H. Scott Allwave 15 tube radio.

He would often like to sit and talk about how he would, after work at Armstrong Tool Company (where he worked as a tool and die maker from 1922 - 1965), meet with Mr. Scott where they would talk and listen to his future radio.

There were a few cabinets he was hooked on, but finally decided on the Tasman cabinet with the side cut outs. It was delivered and set up for him. He said it

A few years later he also purchased a double outlet Allwave antenna, which we still have. The Scott has been played daily for much of its life. A few tubes were replaced about ten years ago and a Blue Sprague Capacitor was put in the power supply.

In the summer of 1968, my grandpa gave his Scott to his son (my father) George T. Kowski to enjoy. On weekends, my dad would play polka music like Li'l Wally. In 1985 I got married and bought a beautiful home and my dad passed it down to me to enjoy now. To this date it is still played daily for an hour or two and it plays and sounds beautiful.

Before my grandpa passed away in 1992, I had purchased a Scott Laurette and a Philharmonic 1940 in a Georgian cabinet. Boy was my grandpa excited.

This picture was taken in early summer of 1992, just a few months before he passed away at the age of 89 1/2 years old. Now he's in heaven with my grandmother Helen, my dad, and Mr. E.H. Scott.

E.H. Scott Radio Laboratories is sometimes confused with H.H. Scott. E.H. Scott was founded in 1925 by Chicago resident Ernest H. Scott. The company motto was "The Fine Things Are Always Made by Hand". The company published news of its latest developments monthly in "The Scott News" from 1929 to 1946. The company was also known as Scott Radio Laboratories, and went through many changes of ownership until its eventual merge with John Meck in the 1950s. Known for its elaborate, high quality radio receivers, the company had no connection to H. H. Scott. In later years, HH Scott filed a lawsuit ending the use of the Scott Radio Laboratories name.
