

# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I am going to cut right to the chase: *Radiofest 2016* is fast approaching! Are you ready?

If you have not already done so, it is not too late to make your plans to attend "<u>The Antique Radio Event of the Summer</u>". Your ARCI club officers and <u>Radiofest 2016</u> volunteers are hard at work to make <u>Radiofest 2016</u> a truly memorable experience. Registrations are running well ahead of last year, with 110 selling spaces already reserved in our swap meet lot as of this writing. It looks like turnout is going to be really strong, so you do not want to miss out! We are also really enthusiastic about our new <u>Medinah Shriners</u> venue, which gives us a large, fully separate swap meet lot directly adjacent to an equally large parking lot for <u>Radiofest</u> attendees. There is plenty of room for both buyers and sellers! And the Shriners' banquet facility is equally nice on the inside, with a huge ballroom for our auction and banquet, and plenty of additional space for our programs and displays. We think you will be impressed! Please find the latest updated information about <u>Radiofest 2016</u> throughout this issue of <u>ARCI News</u>.

AUCTION... Registration for the Radiofest auction on Friday evening, July 29, opens officially at 3:30 PM, but we will make every effort to open up as early as possible, once our auction volunteers have completed their setup. We strongly urge you to arrive early to avoid long lines and delays at the registration desk. The auction is always a very popular event, and the registration lines get longer as the afternoon goes on. Your patience and understanding are always appreciated. All items for auction must come through the main entrance of the Shriners' facility. There is a driveway directly in front of the entrance where you can park temporarily to drop off your items. We want to avoid vehicles blocking the entrance, so we ask that you immediately move your vehicle to the parking lot before taking your items to the ballroom. The Crescent Ballroom entrance is located straight across from the outside entrance to the facility. We strongly suggest you bring a hand truck or cart with you, especially if you are transporting large or heavy items. There will also be some carts available, but expect these to be in "heavy rotation". Parking for auction attendees will be in the parking lot directly in front of the facility. Ample parking will be available. Please also note that only sellers with permits to park in the swap meet lot will be allowed to park there during the auction. The swap meet lot will not be available for general parking at any time during Radiofest.

*HOTEL ROOMS...* As of July 11, the Hilton Garden Inn informs us that a small number of rooms are still available for Friday and Saturday night at the special ARCI rate. But we do expect to completely sell out the entire room block before July 29th. If you haven't made reservations yet, please do so as soon as possible. In the event the Hilton is completely full, the closest alternate hotels to the Hilton Garden Inn are:

Hampton Inn & Suites: (630) 495-9511 Fairfield Inn & Suites: (630) 629-1500 **FOOD & DRINKS...**We are working closely with the Shriners' catering department to provide a selection of food and drinks for purchase during both the auction and the swap meet. Details are still being worked out as of this writing. In addition, the nearby Hilton Garden Inn restaurant will be open for breakfast, lunch and dinner, on all days, with extended lunch hours on Saturday. A list of restaurants in the vicinity of the Shriners facility will also be available at the *Radiofest* registration table.

NO ELECTRONICS DISPOSAL... The Illinois EPA has substantially tightened the rules regarding disposal of electronics items in state landfills. This situation will affect us at Radiofest 2016 and beyond, and we need your help. We are required to keep regular trash and electronic waste separate at the meet. This means no electronics may be placed in our trash container at *Radiofest*. A separate area for electronic items will be provided. Due to cost and size constraints, we will be required to place limits on items that are placed in the disposal/donation auction area. The main purpose will be for disposal of items that did not sell in the donation auction. We therefore ask for your cooperation on the following: Do not use our recycling area at *Radiofest* for any electronics you simply intend to throw away. We cannot accommodate such items and they should not be brought to Radiofest. Items to be placed in our donation auction should have a reasonable possibility of being useful to another collector. In other words, please exercise discretion when placing items in the auction pile. If you do not believe anyone will really want it, then please do not put it in the auction. We will be monitoring the donation auction area carefully, and ARCI does reserve the right to reject any item that we do not deem acceptable for the donation auction. We thank you in advance for your cooperation in this important matter.

**TENT STAKES ARE STRICTLY PROHIBITED...** Just a friendly reminder: Our agreement with the Medinah Shriners strongly stipulates that no tent stakes will be used in the swap meet lot. This rule will be strictly enforced by ARCI.


## RADIOFEST HOTEL — NEW LOCATION



# MAIN AUCTION ON FRIDAY NIGHT

The Main Auction will take place on Friday evening in the Crescent Ballroom and adjoining Music Room, with a starting time of 6:30 PM. Check-in for the Main Auction will open no later than 3:30pm. We anticipate another very busy auction this year, so we suggest you allow as much time as possible to register and get your items in place. Sellers will be able to unload their items through the front entrance of the Medinah facility until 6:00PM on Friday. The Crescent Ballroom is easily accessible from the front entrance, but we strongly suggest you bring your own hand truck or rolling cart with you, if you are bringing heavy or oversized items. Ample parking for buyers and sellers will be available in the lot directly in front of the facility.

This year, ARCI will again partner with the Vintage Radio Phonograph Society (VRPS) from Irving Texas to run the main auction, and Nick Tillich, president of the Wisconsin Antique Radio Club, Inc. (WARCI) will handle the computers and processing. Jim Sargent, VRPS member and professional auctioneer, has again generously contributed his time and skills to call the auction, and will be assisted by our team of volunteers.

Fees are unchanged from last year: \$7 per item for sellers (\$10 for non-members), bidding cards at \$3 each (\$5 for non-members) and a 10% buyer's premium applies. There is a limit of 10 lots per person

The auction format will be the same as last year, allowing sellers to continue to state a confidential reserve. We plan to have our trusty team of volunteers and assistants in place to make the check-in/check-out process as smooth as possible. We will do everything to make the check-in/check-out process as smooth and quick as possible, but we know that sometimes the lines can get a little long during these periods. We very much appreciate your continued patience and courtesy during this process.

Our Radiofest main auction has gained a well-deserved reputation for having some of the most unique, high quality goods, and we expect much the same for this year. We have been informed that there will be some very interesting items placed in this year's auction, including some rare and collectible vintage hi-fi equipment! So, please plan on making this part of your Radiofest experience. It's great fun, and you may just find that rare treasure you've been looking for! There will food and refreshments available for purchase throughout the duration of the auction.

# SATURDAY & SUNDAY SWAP MEET

The Swap Meet will be held in the west parking area of the Medinah Shriners' facility. This is a large, well-maintained parking area that will give us plenty of space for sellers, including those bringing in larger vehicles and trailers. All selling spaces will be pre-assigned by ARCI, and we will strictly enforce those space assignments.

As in previous years, all sellers will be asked to check-in at the Registration Area at the entrance to the parking lot prior to occupying their selling space. Parking permits, which must be prominently displayed in each vehicle's windshield, will be given out upon arrival at the lot.

The Medinah facility will invoice the club for any repairs of damage to their parking surface, so please take this requirement seriously.

Parking for buyers and all other Radiofest attendees will be in the main parking lot, directly adjacent to the sellers' lot. It is a short and easy walk from one lot to the other. The Hilton Garden Inn Hotel has its own separate lot for all hotel guests.

The Crescent Ballroom will be the site of the annual "Carl and Carolyn Knipfel Banquet". The entertainment this year will feature the Windy City Harmonica Trio. Banquet tickets are priced at \$40 per person. This year, we will change the food service format from pre-ordered limited menu choices to a buffet style banquet with a large variety of meal choices available. # PLANS UNDERWAY FOR VINTAGE HAM STATION AT RADIOFEST

Jim Novak, WA9FIH is currently planning our vintage amateur radio station for Radiofest. We typically set up stations capable of AM, SSB and CW operation on the 75/80, 40 and 20 meter ham bands, as well as two meter FM (146.520 simplex and via the Six Meter Club's 146.970 repeater 107.2 Hz tone), using gear that dates from the vacuum tube era into early solid state units. A Special Event Station will be on the air Friday afternoon and all day Saturday. We will be using the new ARCI call letters WA9RCI.

Last year, equipment and antennas were provided by Jim Novak WA9FIH, Ed Schumacher WA9GQK, and Chris Farley KC9IEQ. # IN MEMORIUM Burt Katz, ARCI Charter Member

# **Burt Katz Passes Away**

We are deeply saddened to report that Burt Katz, 78, beloved husband of Sharon Katz and devoted father and grandfather, passed away on April 30. Services were held

on May 2. Burt was a legendary Chicago pizza master and a Charter Member of ARCI. He was the founder of The Inferno in Evanston, Gulliver's Pizza in Chicago, Pequod in Morton Grove and long-time owner of Burt's Place in Morton Grove. In recent years, he was featured on the cover of the international food magazine Saveur and on Anthony Bourdain's television show No Reservations. David Manilow, creator and executive producer of the WTTW restaurant review TV show Check, Please! said, "Burt was one of my favorite characters in the 15 years of Check, Please!" Bourdain said, "His was the only deep dish pizza I ever loved."

Burt's iconoclastic attitude was his trademark, "I've always been independent. I'm like a salmon—I swim upstream." Pequod, and later Burt's Place, were known for their homegrown atmosphere with their old furniture, mismatched dinnerware, and walls covered with vintage radios, telephone and photos. Burt's dismissive and crusty demeanor was somewhat of an act that was offset by Sharon's warm and welcoming hospitality. Swamped by regulars at the restaurant, both Burt and Sharon were well loved and were recognized for their generosity to the community. They both cared deeply for the customers and their product.

Born in 1937 in Chicago, Burt grew up in the Wicker Park neighborhood. His mother died when he was 10. His father died when Burt was in the U.S. Marine Corps. He studied history at Roosevelt University. Burt and Sharon traveled the world on a honeymoon trip that made headlines in 1962. They went around-the-world starting in Japan and then drove through several countries including Pakistan, Iran and Afghanistan. In Lisbon they shipped the truck to Chicago, but they never drove it again. Katz donated it to a friend's auto museum, which eventually closed and sold it for scrap. Two years ago the original truck was sold on eBay with its original markings from the 1962 trip still painted on it. With no culinary training, Burt opened The Inferno and later Gulliver's. He tried working in the corporate world but found it limiting, so he left and last shaved in April, 1971, eventually growing his trademark beard. That year he opened the original Pequod in Morton Grove. After a short retirement, he returned in 1989 to open his final and most famous restaurant, originally called Starback's, that was later renamed Burt's Place. Burt manned the kitchen while Sharon dealt with the customers. All of Burt's pizzas were known for their unique caramelized crusts and their ultra fresh toppings which Burt personally shopped for each morning at local stores.

Burt was well known to radio collectors. He frequented garage and estate sales and attended ARCI in the first ten years of its existence. Burt loved the radios and his collecting friends, but he opposed the high pricing and speculative nature of the hobby as it expanded in the 1990s. Still, he continued to collect on his own, and was always happy to show his latest find or gift received from a customer. The restaurant remained a popular dinner location for north side ham radio operators and collectors. Burt's Place closed for short intervals in the past few years as Burt and Sharon dealt with health issues. The restaurant was finally closed in fall 2015. Pequod and Gulliver's remain open under their current ownership (both restaurants were sold many years ago).

For Julia and me, we often went to Burt's Place late, near closing time, so we could enjoy the rare privilege of staying after hours with Burt and Sharon. We will always remember our young sons, John and Mike, freely exploring the restaurant and its collections, with Burt's encouragement, while we sat and visited with Burt and Sharon. He always wanted to show the latest radio or odd antique, quizzing the kids to see if they knew what is was. It was like visiting your grandparents, and Burt and Sharon treated us like family. We, along with all of the other customers who had the good fortune of getting to know Burt and Sharon over the years, will miss them both.

Burt's Place has now been sold to two former customers who have no culinary experience. They are intent on preserving the original recipes, and they intend to maintain the atmosphere in tribute to Burt and Sharon. They are in the process of training and are working toward reopening Burt's Place soon.

# RADIO CORPORATION OF AMERICA

### **Organization by General Electric**

After World War I began in August 1914, the western Allies cut the German transatlantic telegraph cables and radio traffic across the Atlantic Ocean increased dramatically. The Central Powers including Germany, Austria-Hungary, and their allies in Europe maintained contact with neutral countries in the Americas via long-distance radio communications, as well as telegraph cables owned by neutral countries such as the Netherlands and Denmark.

In 1917, the United States took charge of patents owned by the major companies involved in radio manufacture in the U.S. in order to devote radio technology to the war effort. All production of radio equipment was allocated to the U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, U.S. Marine Corps, and the U.S. Coast Guard. The War Department and the Navy Department sought to maintain a federal monopoly of all uses of radio technology. The wartime takeover of all radio systems ended late in 1918 after the U.S. Congress failed to pass a bill which would have extended this monopoly. The war itself ended in November of that year.

The termination of the federal government's monopoly in radio communications did not prevent the War and Navy Departments from creating a national radio system for the United States. On April 8, 1919, Navy Admiral W. H. G. Bullard and Captain Stanford C. Hooper met with executives from the General Electric Corporation (GE) and asked them to discontinue selling GE's Alexanderson alternators (used in high-power AM radio transmitters) to the British-owned Marconi Company and its subsidiary, the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America.

The Navy proposal argued that if GE created an American-owned radio company, then the Army and Navy would create a monopoly of long-distance radio communications via this new company. A series of negotiations ensued through which GE acquired the American Marconi company and then incorporated the new Radio Corporation of America (RCA).



### **Establishment**

The consolidation of assets from the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of America (including David Sarnoff as an employee), the Pan-American Telegraph Company, and other assets already controlled by the U.S. Navy formed the core of a new public company, RCA. GE owned a controlling interest in RCA which was established on October 17, 1919.

Cooperation among RCA, General Electric, United Fruit Company, Westinghouse Electric Corporation, and American Telephone & Telegraph (AT&T) led to hundreds of innovations in high-power radio technology, and also the creation of the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) and eventually television broadcasting and TV products. The U.S. Army and U.S. Navy each granted RCA the former American Marconi radio terminals that had been confiscated during the War. Admiral Bullard received a seat on RCA's Board of Directors. All of these efforts resulted in federally-created monopolies for GE and Westinghouse Corporation in radio and monopolies in telephone systems for AT&T.

The Department of War and the Department of the Navy continued to argue that the usable radio frequencies were limited, and should be appropriated for use by the U.S. government before other countries, such as the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Canada, monopolized them. This assumption collapsed in the mid-1920s after the discovery of practical shortwave radio bands

(3.0 MHz through 30.0 MHz) for very long-range radio communications.

RCA's first chief executive officer was Owen D. Young, and David Sarnoff became its general manager. RCA's incorporation documents required that a majority of its stock must be held by American citizens. RCA agreed to market the radio equipment manufactured by GE and Westinghouse, and RCA later acquired the radio patents held by Westinghouse and the United Fruit. As the years went on, RCA either took over, or produced for itself, a large number of including of patents, that the superheterodyne receiver invented by Edwin Howard Armstrong.

Over the years, RCA continued to operate international telecommunications services, under its subsidiary RCA Communications, Inc., and later the RCA Global Communications Company.

### **Expansion**

By 1926 the market for commercial radio had expanded, and RCA purchased the WEAF and WCAP radio stations and networks from AT&T. RCA merged them with its WJZ (the predecessor of WABC in New York) and WRC (presently WTEM in Washington) smaller chains of stations to form the National Broadcasting Company (NBC).

RCA significantly expanded its radio manufacturing activities. GE used RCA as its retail arm for radio sales from the beginning in 1919, when GE began production, until 1930. Westinghouse also marketed home radios through RCA until 1930

In 1929, RCA purchased the Victor Talking Machine Company, then the world's largest manufacturer of phonographs, under the famous "Victrola" brand, and phonograph records. RCA's acquisition included a majority ownership of the Victor Company of Japan (JVC). The new subsidiary was reincorporated as a subsidiary to RCA, "RCA-Victor". With Victor, RCA owned new worldwide rights to the "Nipper" trademark. (This Trademark is also the trademark for the British music and entertainment company HMV

who now displays Nipper in Silhouette.) RCA Victor produced many radio-phonographs and also created RCA Photophone, a sound-on-film system for sound films that competed with William Fox's sound-on-film Movietone and Warner Bros.' sound-on-disc Vitaphone. The acquisition of Victor also gave RCA superior manufacturing and distribution capabilities in Camden, New Jersey. RCA soon added the manufacturing of radios as well as phonographs and records to the facilities' production.

RCA began selling the first electronic turntable in 1930. In 1931, RCA Victor started selling 33½ rpm records. These had the standard groove size (the same width as the contemporary 78 rpm records), rather than the "microgroove" that was used in post-World War II 33½ "Long Play" records. Unfortunately, the format was a commercial failure. It was launched at the height of the Great Depression and the records and playback equipment were expensive. In addition, the audio performance was poor. The smaller-radius stylus of the microgroove system had not yet been developed which would make slower-speed records perform acceptably. The system was withdrawn from the market after about a year. In 1932, RCA introduced the Duo Jr. turntable, that was designed to be plugged into radios. Later in the decade, RCA sold the modernistic RCA Victor M Special, a polished aluminum portable record player designed by John Vassos, which became an icon of 1930s American industrial design.

The year 1930 also brought RCA's agreement to occupy the yet-to-be-constructed Rockefeller Center complex, 30 Rockefeller Plaza in New York City. This landmark building was known after 1933 as the RCA building. RCA had provided the critical lease in this massive project that enabled it to proceed as a commercially viable venture.

### Separation from GE

In 1930, the U.S. Department of Justice brought antitrust charges against RCA, GE and Westinghouse. In a complex settlement, GE and Westinghouse gave up their ownership interests in RCA, RCA was allowed to keep its radio factories, and GE and Westinghouse were allowed to compete in that business after 30 months.

### Television and WWII

RCA demonstrated an all-electronic television system at the 1939 New York World's Fair, and developed the USA's first television test pattern. RCA began regular experimental television broadcasting from the NBC studios to the New York metropolitan

area on April 30, 1939 via station W2XBS, Channel 1 (which evolved into WNBC channel 4) from a transmitter atop the **Empire** State Building. At the same time, RCA began selling their first television set models in New With York stores. the introduction of the NTSC standard, the Federal Communications Commission authorized the start commercial television transmission on July 1, 1941. World War II slowed the deployment of television across the U.S., but RCA again began selling television sets almost immediately after the war ended. During the war, RCA was heavily involved in research and manufacturing of radar and radio development in support of the war effort. RCA ranked 43rd among all U.S. corporations in the value of its wartime military production contracts.

### **Tubes**

RCA was a major producer of vacuum tubes under the Radiotron brand. RCA created a series of innovative products ranging from octal base metal tubes co-developed with GE before WWII to the transistor-sized Nuvistor used in the tuners of the New Vista series of TV sets. The Nuvistor tubes were one of the last successes for vacuum tubes, and were meant to compete with the newly introduced transistor. Their combined power in the marketplace was so strong that they effectively set the selling prices for vacuum tubes in the U.S. By 1975, the company had completely switched from tubes to solid-state devices in their television sets, except for the main cathode ray tube (CRT).

### **NBC Breakup**

Antitrust concerns led the FCC to force the breakup of the NBC radio networks, which was affirmed in cases brought before the U.S. Supreme Court. On October 12, 1943, the "NBC Blue" radio network was sold to candy magnate Edward J. Noble for \$8,000,000, and renamed "The Blue Network, Inc". It would become the American Broadcasting Company (ABC) in 1946. The "NBC Red" network retained the NBC name, and RCA retained ownership.

### **Diversification and Research**

RCA produced its RCA Television Quad head 2" color recorder/ reproducer used at broadcast studios in the late 1960s through the early 1980s. Based on a design originally developed by Ampex in the mid-1950s, it used a vertical scanning drum with head motion at 90° to tape direction. This method was developed prior to helical scanning, used in commercial and home tape machines.

In 1941, prior to the attack on Pearl Harbor, RCA laid the cornerstone for its new research and development facility, RCA Laboratories in Princeton, New Jersey. This lab, led for many years by Elmer Engstrom, developed many innovations, such as color television, the electron microscope, CMOS-based technology, heterojunction physics, optoelectronic emitting devices, liquid crystal displays (LCDs), videocassette recorders, direct broadcast television, direct broadcast satellite systems and high-definition television. From 1988 to January 2011, the Lab was called Sarnoff Corporation, a subsidiary of SRI International, after which it was fully integrated into SRI.

Beginning in World War II, RCA set up several new divisions for defense, space exploration and other activities. The RCA Service Corporation provided large numbers of staff for the Distant Early Warning (DEW) Line. RCA units won five Army–Navy 'E' Awards for Excellence in production. Also during the war, ties between RCA and JVC were severed.

In 1949, RCA Victor released the first 45 rpm record to the public, to compete with CBS/Columbia's 33½ rpm "LP" format. The RCA 33½ rpm "LP" records themselves became a reality in 1950, and in 1951, so did the CBS/Columbia 45 rpm record.

In 1953, RCA's all-electronic color TV technology was adopted as the standard for American color TV. It is now known as NTSC (after the "National Television System Committee" that approved it). RCA cameras and studio gear, particularly of the TK-40/41 series, became standard equipment at many American television network affiliates, as RCA CT-100 ("RCA Merrill" to dealers) television sets introduced color television to the public.

In 1955, RCA sold its Estate large appliance operations to Whirlpool Corporation. As part of the deal, Whirlpool was given the right to market "RCA Whirlpool" appliances through the mid-1960s.

Incredibly, despite RCA's indisputable leadership in television technology, David Sarnoff in 1955 commented, "Television will never be a medium of entertainment".

### **Computers**

RCA's scope grew to encompass computers. It was one of several major computer companies that also included IBM, Digital Equipment Corporation, Burroughs, Control Data Corporation, General Electric, Honeywell, NCR and Sperry Rand through most of the 1960s. RCA marketed the Spectra 70 Series (models 15, 25, 35, 45, 46, 55, 60 and 61) that were hardware, but not compatible software, with IBM's System/360 series, and the RCA Series (RCA 2, 3, 6, 7) competing against the IBM System/370. These systems all ran RCA's real-memory operating systems, DOS and TDOS. RCA's virtual memory systems, the Spectra 70/46 and 70/61 and the RCA 3 and 7, could also run their Virtual Memory Operating System, VMOS. VMOS was

originally named TSOS (Time Sharing Operating System), but was renamed to expand the system beyond the time-sharing market. TSOS was the first mainframe, demand paging, virtual memory operating system on the market. The English Electric System 4 range, the 4-10, 4-30, 4-50, 4-70 and the time-sharing 4-75 computers were essentially RCA Spectra 70 clones of the IBM System/360 and 370 range. RCA abandoned computers in 1971. Sperry Rand officially took over the RCA base in January 1972.

RCA Graphic Systems Division (GSD) was an early supplier of electronics designed for the printing and publishing industries. It contracted with German company Rudolf Hell to market adaptations of the Digiset photocomposition system as the Videocomp, and a Laser Color Scanner. The Videocomp was supported by a Spectra computer that ran the Page-1 and, later the Page-II and FileComp composition systems. RCA later sold the Videocomp rights to Information International Inc. (III).

#### Later years

RCA was a major proponent of the eight-track tape cartridge, which it launched in 1965. The eight-track cartridge initially had a huge and profitable impact on the consumer marketplace. Sales of the 8-track tape format peaked early as consumers increasingly favored the compact cassette tape format developed by Philips.

David Sarnoff, whose ambition and business acumen had helped RCA become one of the world's largest companies, turned the company over to his son Robert in 1970. David died the next year, aged 80.

On September 17, 1971, the NBC Nightly News read a news bulletin issued by the RCA Board of Directors just minutes before the broadcast, announcing the Board's decision to cease operation of its general-purpose computer systems division (RCA-CSD). This marked a milestone in RCA's move away from technology and into

a diversified conglomerate. (The introduction by IBM of the 370 series required RCA to make a substantial new investment in its computer division, and the Board decided against making that investment.)

During the late 1960s and 1970s, RCA Corporation, as it was now formally known, ventured into other markets. Under Robert Sarnoff's leadership, RCA diversified far beyond electronics and communications, in a broader American corporate trend toward "conglomerates." The company acquired Hertz (rental cars), Banquet (frozen foods), Coronet (carpeting), Random House (publishing) and Gibson (greeting cards), yet slipped into financial disarray, with wags calling it "Rugs Chickens & Automobiles" to poke fun at their attempt at becoming a conglomerate.


Robert Sarnoff was ousted in a 1975 boardroom coup led by Anthony Conrad, who resigned a year later after he admitted failing to file income tax returns for six years. RCA maintained its high standards of engineering excellence in broadcast engineering and satellite communications equipment, but ventures such as the NBC radio and television networks declined.

In about 1980, RCA shifted the manufacture of its television sets to Mexico. RCA was still profitable in 1983, when it switched manufacturing of its VHS and VCRs from Panasonic to Hitachi. Yet, other forays into new consumer electronics products lost money. The SelectaVision videodisc system, not to be confused with the same trademark that RCA applied to its VCRs, never developed the manufacturing volumes to substantially bring down its price, could not compete against cheaper, recordable videotape technology, and was abandoned in 1985 at a loss of several hundred million dollars.

In 1981, Columbia sold its share in the home video division to RCA and its division was renamed outside of North America to "RCA/Columbia Pictures International Video" and the following year, it was renamed in North America to "RCA/Columbia Pictures Home Video".

In 1983, Arista Records owner Bertelsmann sold 50% of Arista to RCA. In 1985, Bertelsmann and RCA formed a joint venture called RCA/Ariola International which took over management of RCA Records.

In 1984, RCA Broadcast Systems Division moved from Camden, New Jersey, to the site of the RCA antenna engineering facility in Gibbsboro, New Jersey. On October 3, 1985, RCA announced it was closing the Broadcast Systems Division. In the years that followed, the broadcast product lines developed in Camden were terminated or sold off, and most of the buildings demolished, except for a few

of the original RCA Victor buildings that had been declared national historical buildings. For several years, RCA spinoff L-3 Communications Systems East was headquartered in the building, but has since moved to an adjacent building built by the city for them. The building now houses shops and luxury loft apartments.

### Takeover and Break-up

Business and financial conditions led to RCA's takeover by GE in 1986 and its subsequent break-up. GE sold its 50% interest in then-RCA/Ariola International Records to its partner Bertelsmann and the company was renamed BMG Music, for Bertelsmann Music Group.

GE then sold the rights to make RCA and GE branded televisions and other consumer electronics products in 1988 to the French Thomson Consumer Electronics, in exchange for some of Thomson's medical businesses.

In 1991, GE sold its share in RCA/Columbia to Sony Pictures and renamed that to "Columbia TriStar Home Video" (later Columbia TriStar Home Entertainment, now Sony Pictures Home Entertainment).

RCA Laboratories was transferred to SRI International as the David Sarnoff Research Center. The laboratories were subject to a five-year plan whereby GE funded all activities for the first year, then reduced its support to near zero after the fifth year. This required the laboratories to change their business model to become an industrial contract research facility.

GE sold the NBC Radio Network to Westwood One and all of its radio stations to various owners. In 2011, Comcast acquired a controlling interest in the NBC, now part of the multimedia venture NBC Universal, and in 2013, Comcast acquired the remaining interests from GE.

Today, the only RCA unit which GE still owns is Government Services.

### **Legacy**

RCA's legacy in products and innovation is unrivalled. RCA branded antique radios, RCA Merrill/CT-100s, and other early color television receivers are among the more sought-after collectible radios and televisions, thanks to their popularity during the golden age of radio, their manufacturing quality, their engineering innovations, their styling and their name, RCA. Most collectable are the pre-war television sets manufactured by RCA beginning in 1939, including the TRK-5, TRK-9 and TRK-12 models.

# ARCI'S NEW WA9RCI VANITY HAM CALL

ARCI's long-awaited vanity ham radio club call letters, WA9RCI, were issued May 17, replacing the KC9IPB club call which we held for the past ten years. The change of call letters had been discussed for some time, and our late trustee, Bill Ross, W9WR, had intended to pursue the matter before his passing. Ron Grams, WB9IMR, had agreed to take over the trusteeship of the license, and following discussion and approval by the membership at our April meeting, the vanity call request was filed and subsequently approved by the FCC and issued at no charge to the club (FCC had been charging a fee for these calls until recently, when they decided that it was counterproductive to do so!).

This clears the way for use of our new call, reflecting the club's A-R-C-I initials, for our ham station at Radiofest. An Amateur Radio station, using vintage equipment, has been a Radiofest tradition going back to the Elgin days during the 1990s when Harry Blesy, N9CQX, set up ham gear at the event for a number of years. In 2005, ARCI applied to the FCC for a Club Station license and received the KC9IPB call, and various members, including Chris Farley, KC9IEQ, Ed Schumacher, WA9GQK, and Jim Novak, WA9FIH, supplied most of the equipment that we used. The mailing address listed on the license is Jim's, who has agreed to continue handling requests for QSL (verification) cards from hams contacting our station.

As noted in the Radiofest articles and information, we will be using our new call, WA9RCI at Radiofest with plans to operate all day Saturday. Two meter FM will be either on 146.52 simplex or via the Six Meter Club repeater, 146.970 (107.2 Hz tone).
