

REGISTER EARLY FOR JUNE HAMFEST COMBINED MEET WITH SIX METER CLUB

The June ARCI swap meet will be a joint event with the Six Meter Club of Chicago on Sunday, June 17, 2018 at the DuPage County Fairgrounds, 2015 Manchester Rd., in Wheaton - just a bit south and west of our ARCI meets at the American Legion in Carol Stream. Last year more than 1,200 radio enthusiasts and hams from 16 states and with visitors from Canada and Mexico participated in the giant flea market and other events, including many ARCI members who were able to park in a special area designated as ARCI Swap Row.

We will have displays from AMSAT, ARRL, NWS/Skywarn and dealer displays. And, the Midwest Classic Radio Net's Hamboree will be back with us again. MCRN is a gathering of hams that operate "boat anchor" equipment on a weekly 3885 kHz AM net.





Everyone MUST have a Hamfest ticket to attend. Tickets are still only \$6 in advance, or \$8 at the gate. There is no charge for outdoor flea market space - please see the registration form for information. Jim Novak will have advance tickets at our April 29th ARCI meet. As usual, ARCI will have its donation auction at 10 am along with the 50-50 drawing. In addition, if you deposit your Hamfest ticket stubs in the drum near the stage in Building 2, you have a chance to win many other prizes including \$300, \$200 and \$100 cash.

Indoor flea market sellers and commercial dealers will be in Buildings 2, 3 and 4 with the outdoor flea market to the east of the Exhibition Hall building and extending north along the east side of the fairgrounds. All traffic will enter and exit through gate S-7 located east of the main exhibition hall. For ham operators, station K9ONA will be on the air, serving as a talk-in station on two meter FM, 146.52 simplex and through the 146.37/97 repeater (107.2 Hz tone). Food, coffee and soda will be available from the Romeoville Knights of Columbus.

For anyone wishing to take an FCC Amateur Radio license exam, testing will be held from 9 to 11 am.

The Hamfest opens to the general public at 7 am (buildings at 8 am), but ARCI members who are willing to help direct traffic for parking – we will need help keeping ARCI Swap Row open for members – can enter at 6 a.m. providing you have an advance ticket and can show positive ARCI ID (your current membership card). You can then pick out your favorite flea market parking space and lend a hand for a few minutes when the gates open at 7. We could also use some help Saturday afternoon after 2 pm setting up signs, the PA system, tables, etc.



Radiofest 2018 will take place at the end of August due to conflicts at the Medinah Shriners. We hope to return to an early August schedule in 2019.

Reserve the dates of Aug. 24-25. Building on the tremendous success of *Radiofest 2017*, we are enthusiastically putting together a two-day schedule of events that will be very similar to last year, except for a few minor changes due, in part, to the elimination of Sunday morning. Be sure to reserve the dates shown above on your calendar for *Radiofest 2018!*

LOCATION: We will return to the **Medinah Shriners in Addison, Illinois.** This new, modern, upscale facility is across from a **Hilton Garden Inn.** The Medinah Shriners is located at the junction of I-355 and Army Trail Road in Addison. This is a very convenient location that can be easily accessed from all directions within the entire Chicago area. See the map below for location details.





HOTEL: Our official hotel for *Radiofest 2018* is the Hilton Garden Inn, located directly adjacent to the Medinah Shriners complex, and a very short walk from the banquet facilities and parking lots. Medinah Shriners and Hilton Garden Inn are completely independent entities, but they coordinate closely on events. SCHEDULE: Just like 2017, we will start the action with our Friday night auction, followed on Saturday morning by the swap meet through mid-afternoon. The swap meet will again be located in its own large parking lot at the west end of the facility. There will be plenty of seller spaces available with lots of room between rows for maneuvering a small truck or a vehicle with a trailer. The sellers' lot is also totally out of the main traffic flow, which is good for those walking around the swap meet. The pavement will be marked with parking spaces and continues to be in excellent physical condition. Directly adjacent to the sellers' lot is the main parking lot, with over 170 spaces available for buyers and visitors. It is an easy walk from one lot to the other, with plenty of spaces available. This parking layout is well-suited for *Radiofest!*

AUCTION: The opening night auction will be in the Medinah Crescent Ballroom, with overflow space in the adjacent Medinah Music Room. The large quantity and excellent quality of items available in the auction make this a "must attend" event. You never know what you will find here, including rare and highly collectible items. Jim Sargent from VRPS is returning to co-manage the auction.

PROGRAMS: Our speakers' programs, contest, and display will occur throughout the day on Saturday, followed by the Carl & Carolyn Knipfel banquet on Saturday night. *Radiofest 2018* speakers' programs will feature three sessions, with a break during the noon hour. Programs will include topics on broadcasting program material through your antique radio, mechanical television, and the Bill Ross Ham Forum with a focus on Heathkits and the Heath Company.

DISPLAY: This year, *Radiofest 2018* will commemorate Electronic Kits. Chances are if you have been around antique radios for a while, you have either built or used a piece of equipment that started out as a kit. Remember names like Heathkit, Allied Radio/Knight Kit and EICO? These are the big names, but there were and continue to be other companies offering kits for radios and electronics equipment. Do you have nice examples of built or unbuilt kits you might be interested in sharing in the display? Along with the kit, any related documentation such as the instruction manual, advertising literature and even the original box would enhance the display. CONTEST: This year's contest categories will include the electronic kits brought in for display and other categories to be announced in the future.

APPRAISALS: We will also have our popular appraisal tent and the outdoor ham station with special ARCI club call letters WA9RCI.

DONATIONS: The usual donation auction will be held late in the afternoon on Saturday. Keep in mind that you may purchase donated items throughout the day without having to wait for the actual donation auction. Either way, your purchase will likely be a bargain! NEWS FROM THE HAMSHACK By: Jim Novak, WA9FIH

NOVICE TWIN TRANSMITTERS: JOHNSON VIKING ADVENTURER AND KNIGHT T-50

A recent e-mail conversation with our Ham Radio station trustee Ron Grams, WB9IMR, jogged my memory about a couple of 1950s era transmitters that were aimed at the market for Novice Class licensees, beginners in amateur radio, who were limited to using Morse code only and required to upgrade to a higher class FCC license within a year.

E.F. Johnson, based in Waseca, Minnesota, offered their Viking Adventurer transmitter as a kit from the mid-1950s until the early 1960s. It was housed in a nice looking maroon and gray cabinet about 7-1/2" x 10-1/2" x 8". It covered the amateur 10, 11, 15, 20, 40 and 80 Meter bands (11 Meters had not been reassigned by the FCC to Citizens Band (CB) at that point), and used a 6AG7 oscillator and 807 power amplifier tube, plus a 5U4G rectifier. The kit sold for \$54.95. Plate input power was

50 Watts, well within the FCC-prescribed 75 Watt Novice limit. Crystal control was required for Novices back then, but Johnson also had a VFO available that could be used when the operator upgraded to General Class. A plug-in screen modulator kit using a 12AU7 and 12AX7 was also available for \$12.25.

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Locally, Chicago's Allied Radio, producers of Knight kits, came out with a competitive Novice transmitter. Originally designated as the 83YX255, but which became commonly known as the T-50, it had a virtually identical design – tubes, schematic, accessory modulator and VFO as well – but, to top it off to the amazement of many, its physical size was the same as the Adventurer. And, the front panel layout perfectly mimicked that of Johnson's rig! There were some minor differences in the radios – the Adventurer was built on an aluminum chassis, while the T-50 used a copper plated steel chassis, and of course, the knob style was unique to each unit.

How did they perform? Well, as with any kit, a lot depended upon how carefully they were constructed. This could be problematic with a "newbie" who might not have much experience with electronics, much less kit building. But, this was a way to get started in Amateur Radio without a huge cash outlay. As such, the kits enabling the newcomer to focus on obtaining the best possible receiver ("if you can't hear them you can't work them") and a decent antenna system.

HISTORY ZONE

An Occasional Column on Historical Items of Interest

REMEMBER SPUTNIK?

Just over sixty years ago, the Soviet Union launched Sputnik, the world's first satellite and the first manmade object to reach space. Launched on October 4, 1957, Sputnik was expected to have a short lifespan because the satellite's electric batteries only would function for two weeks. However, Sputnik stayed in its elliptical low-earth orbit for three months. Sputnik burned up on January 4, 1958, while reentering Earth's atmosphere after completing 1,440 orbits and travelling a distance of about 43 million miles / 70 million kilometers.

The Year Was 1958

The International Geophysical Year (IGY) was an international scientific project that lasted from July 1, 1957, to December 31, 1958. It was celebrated around the world with scientific programs and initiatives. Sputnik was a spectacular feat designed to coincide with the IGY. A byproduct of Soviet Premier Nikita Kruschev's quest for an intercontinental missile and the desire of Soviet scientists to design a vehicle for manned space flight, Sputnik was at once both small and spectacular.


A Radio in The Sky

Sputnik demonstrated the Soviet Union's technological advancement and spurred the United States into stepping up its game in the newly christened "space race." Sputnik, which means "traveling companion" in Russian, was a sphere approximately 23 inches / 58 centimeters in diameter, with four long antennas protruding from its head. It weighed 184 pounds / 83 kilograms, and included a radio beacon that transmitted a beeping sound as it orbited the earth every 98 minutes. The transmitter's beeping could be heard on the world's radio stations, and the satellite could be seen with the naked eye in the night sky as it passed overhead



A Soviet space scientist with Sputnik before the launch. (History.com)


News reports at the time stated that anyone with a short-wave receiver could hear the new Russian satellite as it hurtled overhead. Worldwide amateur radio organizations like the Amateur Radio Relay League (ARRL) gave instructions to their members. Radio operators sought QSL cards as a written confirmation of their one-way reception of the radio signal from Sputnik. Popular Electronics, QST, and other periodicals explained how to obtain the QSL cards and included pictures of those received.



1957 SPUTNIK Space Pavilion VDNKh Exhibition - Russian postcard. (Authors' collection)


The Radio Transmitter and Antennas

Sputnik was made of two hemispheres, each two-millimeters (mm) thick and covered with a highly polished one-mm-thick heat shield made of aluminum-magnesium-titanium AMG6T alloy. Sputnik contained the following items in its heat-resistant sphere: a radio transmitter; power supply system made out of three silver-zinc batteries; remote switch; thermal system fan; dual sequencer switch for the thermal control system; thermal control switch; and a barometric switch. Sputnik's transmitters were described as D-200 units, which were characterized as "vacuum valve-type" with a power of one watt. One transmitter operated on a frequency of 20.005 megahertz (MHz)—megacycles in 1957—and the other on 40.002 MHz. These frequencies allowed reception by amateurs using existing equipment. They also enabled a receiver set at exactly 20 or 40 MHz to produce an audio tone plus or minus the Doppler shift without ever going through zero hertz (Hz). This ensured that Sputnik's telemetry was audible throughout an entire pass without additional tuning of the receiver.

Sputnik's antennas consisted of four whips attached to the aluminum sphere through insulators that were spaced symmetrically around the circumference of the spherical casing. These elements extended at a 70-degree angle to each other and gave the satellite its iconic shape. The antenna configuration blended the need for simplicity with the space constraints of the launch vehicle and function. During launch, the antenna elements were compressed against the side of the rocket at an angle of 45 degrees and were held in place by clips and a conical shroud that protected the satellite. The antennas are described as matched pairs, one 2.4 meters and the other 2.9 meters in length. They were likely some variation of a center-fed dipole, with the longer pair radiating the 20-MHz (14-meter) signal and the shorter pair set up for 40 MHz (7.5 meters). Sputnik had no mechanism for spin-stabilization that would maintain its antennas in any particular orientation relative to a receiving station on earth. However, the antennas had an almost spherical radiation pattern, so that the satellite transmissions were made with equal power in all directions, making reception of the transmitted signal independent of the satellite's rotation.

Sputnik was filled with nitrogen at an internal pressure of 1.3 atmospheres. The power supply to the radio transmitter and the thermal control system were activated by a remote switch that was triggered by a sensor at the moment the launch vehicle and the satellite separated. The radio transmitter emitted signals lasting 0.4 seconds. If the temperature onboard the satellite ever exceeded 50 degrees Celsius or fell below zero degrees Celsius, or if the pressure inside fell below 0.35 kilograms per square centimeter, thermal and barometric switches were activated that changed the length of the radio signal transmitted by the satellite. A special fan was used to maintain normal temperature inside the satellite. The fan was activated when the interior temperature exceeded 30 degrees Celsius. If the temperature fell below 20 degrees Celsius, the fan would turn off. A dual thermal switch was responsible for turning the fan on and off.

The Space Race

On November 3, 1957, the Soviet Union launched a second, heavier Sputnik carrying a dog, Laika ("Barker" in Russian), providing evidence of a significantly advanced capability to use the outer-space environment. At the time, Sputnik I and II's significance gave the Soviet Union tremendous prestige and provoked great anxiety in the United States and amongst its allies. Today, historians conclude that the artificial satellite's biggest impact was the incredible legacy of space exploration achievements that it inspired. Sputnik is credited for instigating President John F. Kennedy's 1961 declaration that America would put a man on the moon before then end of the decade, and with stimulating an international technology "space race" that generated spectacular accomplishments.

Sputnik's launch led the U.S. government to focus and consolidate space exploration programs in different agencies. On January 31, 1958, the Army launched Explorer I. This American satellite carried a small scientific payload that discovered the magnetic radiation belts around the Earth, later named after principal investigator James Van Allen. That summer, Congress and President Dwight D. Eisenhower created the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), which came into being October 1, 1958. Sputnik went on to inspire a generation of engineers and scientists.







Sputnik's launch created an international rivalry that lasted decades and sent Americans to the moon, but which ultimately gave way to cooperation and collaboration. Sixty years later, Americans and Russians not only work alongside each other, but also alongside astronauts from many other countries aboard the International Space Station.

Sputnik's Enduring Fame

The launch of Sputnik I and II occurred in late 1957 and early 1958. Yuri Gagarin became the first man in space in April 1961, followed by John Glenn in February 1962 and ultimately the astronauts of Apollo 11 who walked on the moon in July 1969. Today, young people can barely name Gagarin, Glenn, Neil Armstrong, Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin and Michael Collins. The Apollo program, Soyuz program, the moon landing, and the Apollo-Soyuz project are distant, fading memories. The International Space Station captures periodic news attention. The end of the Space Shuttle Program terminated, for the time being, America's frequent journeys into space. Yet, Sputnik remains easily identifiable. Its heritage can be seen in the enduring popularity of Sputnik collectibles. Sputnik's shape and sounds continue to appear in our pop culture.

Perhaps today we need another Sputnik moment to inspire the nation and the world about space, radio, and the quest for science in the way that a little satellite did 60 years ago.

Sputnik's Visit to Radiofest

In 2005, ARCI had the rare opportunity of seeing an actual Sputnik I. That year, the *Radiofest* contest director Bob Drake brought a very special surprise. Bob was able to borrow one of the original Russian Sputnik I satellites, and placed it on display in the contest room. This Sputnik satellite was one of about twenty, of which ten were eventually placed into orbit beginning with the first launch on October 4, 1957. The surplus Sputniks were sold by the Russian government, and this one belonged to a private collector who opted to remain undisclosed. What a treat for all the *Radiofest* attendees!!!
